The main event, a ten round set to between Romeo Hagan of Seattle and Gordon McKay of Pocatello, was won hands down by McKay, who came from the encounter without the sign of having been engaged in exchanging wallops with the fighting baker. Hagan however displayed evidences of the mix-up, and it was only his gameness and ability to take punishment that saved him from being knocked out. Twice during the milling Hagan went to the canvass. McKay followed his usual style of letting his opponent carry the fight to him and did his best work in countering the attack.

The semi-final event, a six-round mill between Curley Eastley of Ontario and Sunshine McClure of Caldwell, was declared a draw by Referee Bill, but it was apparent that Eastley was in the better condition of the two at the final gong. This injury was secured in the second stanza, so McClure's gameness needs no further confirmation.

The opening event was a scintillating exhibition of amateur mill slugging by Young Kline of Payette and Young McGettrick of Ontario. Honors were even. The boys delivered numerous haymakers that never landed while wild punches carelessly aimed got home unexpectedly at times. The crowd liked this event, and the remainder of the card as well.
