1. That we and each of us, either jointly or severally, are the owners of a tract of land of one or more acres within the boundaries of the proposed irrigation district as hereinafter set forth and described, and that we constitute more than fifty per cent of the different owners of land within said proposed district and susceptible of irrigation from the proposed system.

2. That all of the lands within the boundaries of the said proposed irrigation district, and as hereinafter described, are susceptible of practical irrigation from the same source and from the same system of works and pumping plant, by means of which it is proposed to take water from Snake river by means of pumps and motors for the irrigation thereof.

3. That your petitioners desire to and do propose to organize an irrigation district under the irrigation laws of the State of Oregon, Chapt. 357, page 743, laws of 1917, and the Acts amendatory thereto, for the purpose of furnishing water for the irrigation of the lands within the boundaries of the said proposed district.
