Mrs. J. W. Allison opened her kindergarten Tuesday for a three months term, with about 15 pupils in attendance the first day.

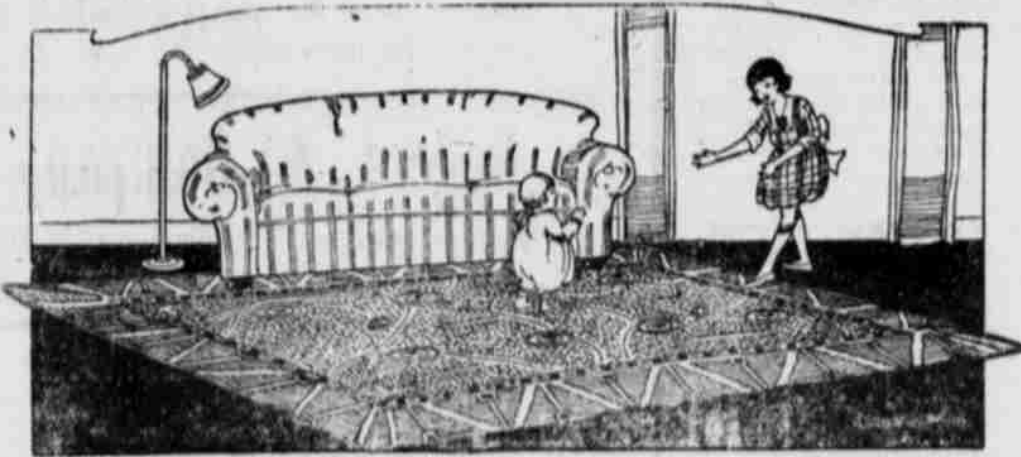
Mrs. Wm. Plughoff and daughter, Miss Dora, of Huntington, were visiting relatives and friends in Ontario this week.
