thru the Ontario National, all on P. M. Goerling of Wausau, Wisconsin. Against these he testified Heyman drew checks to L. Harris and sent these checks to Goerling.

Individual can not take that degree of interest, he or she will not be entitled to say: "Why don't they do something?" It is up to the individual right now.

The committee has the list prepared and has placed it at the Taggart Hardware store, where it will be convenient for anyone to sign. The number of the lots for which water is wanted must be listed before the committee will be able to determine what the cost of service in the summer will be. The water will be furnished at cost. There will be no overhead expense.

The ditches must be put in shape and the committee has numerous details to work out, but everything depends upon getting the lots listed. When this is done the per lot basis will be arrived at and the funds will be collected. The cost for the entire season must be paid in advance and the money placed in the bank before the service started. That was one of the conditions upon which the water was secured for the season.

The moral of this story is to act now. If Ontario citizens who object to sprinkling really want ditch water this is the only means that can be found to get it. It is strictly up to the individual to act, and act at once.
