**KEEP UP WAR ON RABBITS THROUGHOUT SUMMER**

The following methods of poisoning rabbits in summer have been used successfully in other counties of the State and will undoubtedly be of interest and benefit to persons in this county in the outlying districts.

**Salted Poisoned Stakes**  
These are prepared by boiling the top five or six inches of soft pine stakes an inch square and a foot long in a solution of one ounce of strychnine sulphate in six quarts of water, adding as much salt as will be dissolved in the water after the strychnine is dissolved. Drive the stakes in the ground along trails or other

places frequented by rabbits. The stakes should be boiled for a couple of hours in the solution and then allowed to dry. The rabbits chew the stakes and are killed. It is about the safest method to use where there is likely to be stock about.

**Strychnine and Salt**  
Use one ounce of powdered strychnine, fifteen ounces of salt and one ounce of brown sugar mixed together. This may be placed in wooden boxes made from 4x4 material mortised out where there is no danger of stock getting to it, or it may be used where stock might get to it by drying sacks made of 2x2 material in the ground and then boring a half-inch hole in the top of the stake to a depth of about two inches, filling the hole with the mixture to within a half-inch of the top.

held for the argument that if the company is entitled to a 12 per cent return, so too is the rancher; and did show on the testimony of witnesses that the ranchers are not making that return even under present exceptionally high prices.

The second phase of the ranchers' case was that of showing that the present high prices will not con-

tinue, C. R. Emison and Lester Sewell were called upon to testify concerning the effect of high hay prices on the cattle and sheep men, and to indicate that these prices are driving the cattle and sheep men from the county, and thus reducing the market possibilities for hay in this valley.

Besides having the complete report of the Idaho hearing made a part of the Oregon record, Attorney Jesso Hawley for the Power company thru witnesses and his own statement set forth that there is a big demand for more power and that the company can not provide for this demand unless it can show a greater earning than one per cent, which he said was all the stockholders of the company had received for the past year.

The ranchers, thru the cross examination by their attorney, W. H. Brooke, brot out the fact that the power company has not delivered all the load it contracts to furnish the various systems and that the inability of the companies to get power when needed is one of the handicaps against which the ranchers work.

The hearing was closely followed and the ranchers agreed to present detailed statements showing the cost of production and the earnings of the ranchers under the pumping plants for the part two years before the final decision of the commission is made.

**CHURCH WILL AID IN AMERICANIZATION**

**Scope of Work to be Extended by New World Movement Program With Part of \$16,000,000 Fund**

Americanization and social service work among the foreign born in the industrial centers of America will be extended by the United Presbyterian Church as a result of the New World Movement, declares Dr. R. A. Hutchison of Pittsburgh, secretary of the home mission board of the denomination.

Appropriations amounting to \$190,500 have been approved for the work among aliens and the funds will be raised in the New World Movement financial campaign, which will be conducted from April 25 to May 2. Classes in English, domestic science, sewing, citizenship, and manual training will be instituted in new centers and the scope of the work already started will be considerably increased.

Among the cities where aid will be extended are: Fall River, Pawtucket and Central Falls in Massachusetts; Sharon, New Kensington, Wilmerding and Mt. Pleasant and Pittsburgh in Pennsylvania; Columbus and Akron in Ohio; Tacoma, Washington; Portland, Oregon, and Los Angeles, California.

The board will teach loyalty to America first and urge the young people's societies to have social programs in the church for the foreign born and to make an effort to have them attend the meetings and services. The board will seek to enlist the young people's societies in making friends of the foreigners, each member in each society being asked to get into personal touch with at least one foreigner and to act as an American brother or sister.

Another feature of the Americanization program will be enlisting foreigners in the celebration of American holidays and to honor our American heroes and representative men in the nation, state and municipal departments of the nation.

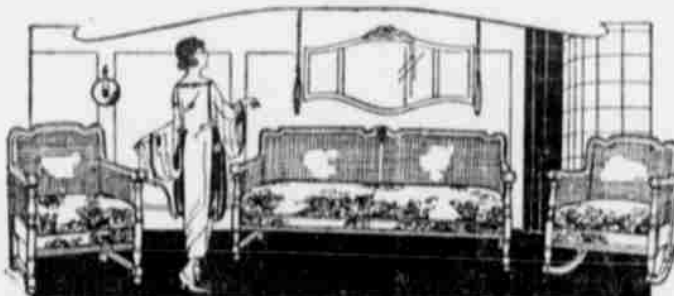

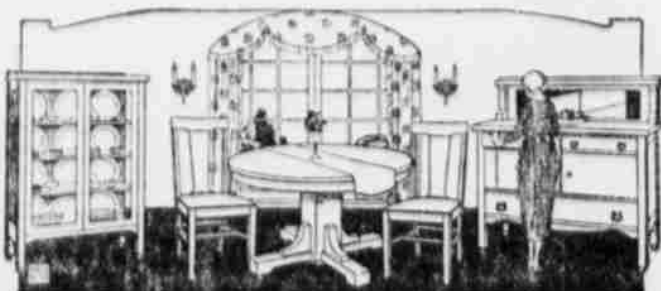

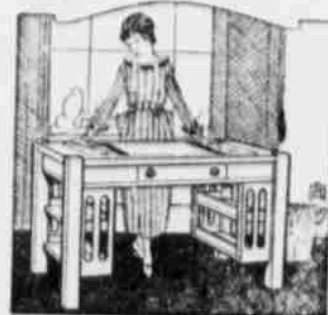
