It is apparent that the Vale and Parma teams are the aggressors in the fight being made against Ontario and that what they want is the \$150 forfeit money that Ontario posted for the season. In fact at a meeting at Payette Tuesday evening that was the avowed intention of the representatives of these teams.

While not desirous of entering into legal actions the local team will take steps to protect itself, for both Weiser and Parma have imported players just as Ontario did with the consent of the other members. Ontario secured its consent from President Graff and he told the directors so, but his position was overruled in the case of Ontario while for Payette, Weiser and Parma permission was given.

Ontario is not denying, and never has that its players were not born and raised in Ontario. But they are working here and all of them live here now. Several of them are married men with families and they have brot their families to the city to make this city their home, not for the ball season only but thereafter.

Manager Propst has been assured by the business men of Ontario who subscribed to the fund that got the team started that they would stay with him, that they appreciated the work he has done and that if it appears that the playing of the schedule in the Idaho-Oregon league is to result in constant bickering that Ontario, while protecting its rights, withdraw from the league which is apparently determined that this city shall not have good base ball. This resolution was unanimously adopted at a meeting of the business men, prior to the gathering of the Commercial club last night.
