FARM BUREAU NOTES

Codling moths are beginning to emerge and it may be necessary to spray about the fifteenth of the month. The moths do not lay their eggs until weather conditions are right, a temperature of about 60 degrees at dusk. Spraying should be timed so as to cover as much foliage with the poison as possible before very many worms have entered apples. As the leaves are growing at this time of the year and new ones coming out, too early spraying will leave unpoisoned leaves for the later moths to lay on. Orchardists will be kept informed of the work of the Payette County Farm Bureau and of the Horticultural Committee in this county in trying to date the time for spraying for the best results.

The two outstanding things in connection with the stockmen's convention at Burns during the month, of significance to the future of the industry, were the decision of every cattleman there to cut down on the number of stock kept and raise better stuff, and the determination evidenced toward having something to say about the marketing for the past three years. While feed has been high, and beef retailing too, the producer of beef has been forced to take a price which netted him a loss in most every instance.

The Payette County Farm Bureau is trying out some experiments with arsenical powder dusted on alfalfa for control of the weevil. While liquid spraying has been used with good results, it is hoped to reduce the cost per acre numerous in the vicinity of New Plymouth and Emmett. The State of Idaho will be quarantined by most of the states, if not all of them, and no hay will be allowed to be shipped, except, perhaps, ground hay or alfalfa meal which must be placed in some sort of containers which will not carry the weevil.

The recent cold snap has reduced the prune crop fifty per cent or more. Apples were not hit so hard but probably twenty-five per cent of the crop was knocked out.

The Malheur County orchardists will meet at Brogan to go over the work of the Horticultural committee in that community and listen to suggestions from Prof. Longley about spraying for codling moth, on Thursday the 10th. The tour of the orchards will begin at 2 P. M. sharp, and a meeting and lunch will take place at 5.
