## OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

### Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

The fifteenth annual convention of the Oregon Bankers' association convened at Eugene Tuesday.

The \$60,000 gravity water project undertaken by Monmouth nearly a year ago has been completed.

While fishing on a dock at Newport, Ivy Howard caught an octopus which measured about six feet in diameter.

Charles A. Barr, resident of Marion county since 1879, died at his home five miles south of Salem. He was 69 years of age.

A picnic for all residents of Marion county is being planned by the Marion County Community federation and will be held sometime in July.

The Roseburg cherry crop is ripening rapidly. Earlier varieties will be plentiful. It is believed, and the late fruit promises heavy yields.

The Linn county farm bureau has decided to arrange a series of poultry culling demonstrations in Linn county during August and September.

Former Salemites from all sections of Oregon and the Pacific northwest assembled at Salem Saturday for the annual homecoming ceremonies.

Eugene and Springfield have joined forces for a Fourth of July celebration. Springfield will celebrate Saturday, July 3, and Eugene Monday, July 5.

Aurora's new artesian well is now flowing at the rate of nearly 40,000 gallons a day, which is several thousand gallons more than the city uses.

Airplane forest fire patrol service in Oregon will not start until June 25, according to a letter received at the office of F. A. Elliott, state forester.

The Sheridan Light & Power Co., with headquarters at Sheridan, has filed with the Oregon public service commission application for an increase in rates.

John Steiger, prominent sheep man and rancher of Baker county and known throughout eastern Oregon, died Friday while on a fishing trip near Baker.

Bert Jewell, of Greenpoint, formerly game warden for Clackamas county, drowned in the Clackamas river when the boat in which he and two companions capsized.

About 80 representatives of Baptist churches of Malheur, Walla, Union and Baker counties attended the Grande Ronde Baptist association, which was held at Baker.

W. H. Smith, Echo farmer, was killed on his ranch by Mayor Asa B. Thompson, of Echo, who went to aid the sheriff in arresting Smith on charges of robbery and assault.

Receipts of the motor vehicle department of the state government for the month of May, 1920, totaled \$99,696, according to a financial statement prepared by the secretary of state.

Unprecedented increase in business during the past few months is given as the reason for the increase in the capital stock of the Pheo company of Salem from \$1,500,000 to \$4,000,000.

A number of men of Coburg and vicinity were cited by Deputy Sheriff Croner to appear before District Attorney Ray and explain why they have not obtained state licenses for their dogs.

Washington county Holstein breeders held a field meeting on the farm of H. Martin, near Eddy. Mr. Martin has a herd of thoroughbred cattle. A cattle judging contest for both adults and boys was staged.

For the purpose of discussing the wool and mohair market situation and the organization of a county wool and mohair growers' association, a series of meetings of growers of wool and mohair will be held in Linn county this week.

The fight of the Dallas churches to close the moving picture theaters in the city on Sunday was lost when the citizens of the town in a special election decided they wanted the Sunday evening shows by a vote of 497 to 260, ending a bitter fight.

A large amusement hall and several homes for employes of the Oregon Lumber company are being constructed at Bates, a lumber camp on the Sumpster Valley railroad, by the lumber corporation, in an effort to better living conditions and afford recreation to its employes.

Between 5000 and 7000 blue-winged teal are to be hatched this year at the state game farm at Eugene, according to State Game Warden Burghdoff. At present 1300 young birds are out and 2500 more are under the hens. The Corvallis farm will also produce about 7000 birds this year.

Because a large number of cases of illness from stomach trouble have developed in Medford from unknown causes, none serious, Dr. E. B. Pickel, city health officer, has issued a warning to all users of city water to boil the water for cooking and drinking purposes until a sample of the water has been analyzed by the state board of health.

Improvement for their opinion and endorsement. If the committees feel that such an excursion can be made to yield as much information as it should, it is the hope of the writer to cooperate with them in making it a success. A good attendance, a well chosen route, and speakers capable of explaining each thing demonstrated along the way, should make it a great occasion.

**Rural Home Betterments.**  
This committee was completed during the month and County Chairman, Mrs. W. L. Davis, has already called a meeting of the members for June 12. Mrs. Davis is anxious to have a definite project put on thru the Farm Bureau for the benefit of the women. It is hoped that the meeting of the committee will result in a decision for some project and steps for securing a specialist in home economics from the College for a week or two to assist in demonstrating work in home betterments.

**Farm Bureau News**  
The second number of the Malheur County Farm Bureau News was edited during the month. The total number printed was 1090. Copies were addressed to all members whose names have been forwarded to the office, and the extras distributed to advertisers, exchanges and farmers in the county. The publication was an 8-page pamphlet carrying an insert in the nature of a questionnaire by the marketing committee.

**Horse Raisers Meeting**  
The writer attended the meeting of the Oregon Cattle and Horse Raisers Association in Burns during the month of May. This meeting was largely attended by the stockmen and was a very profitable meeting. The features which seemed of most importance to the farmers and stockmen of this county were (1) The universal opinion among the stockmen that a cut must be made in the number of livestock kept and the quality improved. Both hay growers and livestock men in the county would well ponder over decision like this on the part of a large number of the most progressive stockmen of the State. (2) There is an apparent determination on the part of leading stockmen to have more to say about the marketing of their produce and a committee was appointed to work out plans for putting the industry on a better basis with regard to markets.

**Union Stock Show**  
The writer visited the Union Stock Show on June 3. A very fine exhibit of Short Horn and Hereford cattle was made and the judging was first class. In cooperation with others, several of the breeders were invited to show at the Malheur County Fair. An exhibit of 1st class animal sat our Fair would add much to its educational value and assist the committee on livestock improvement in arousing interest in better stock.

**Alfalfa Weevil**  
During the month occasion was taken to visit the alfalfa weevil infested fields near New Plymouth, Idaho, and to inspect methods of control being conducted there in some fields experimentally, by the Idaho College. The weevil has become so numerous there in some places that one sweep with the net will average around thirty or forty beetles and larvae. Spraying with liquid arsenate spray was tried out last year in several places with pretty good results. The Idaho people are experimenting this year with arsenical dusting. The dust, composed of four pounds of lead arsenate and one pound of sulphur, is applied by means of a machine such as is used for potatoes in applying a dust insecticide. The results appear to be good. As this method is cheaper than the liquid spray and easier to apply, it is hoped that the preliminary work will be fully established. The cost of the dusting is estimated at about a dollar and a quarter per acre. By destroying the larva of the first brood, by treatment of the first crop, the pest, so it is said, can be pretty effectively controlled. However, it is not supposed that it can be entirely done away with, but spraying would be necessary probably as long as alfalfa is grown.

In order to ascertain the facts with regard to this pest in Malheur County, the writer has undertaken a survey of the alfalfa producing sec-

tions. This survey will not be complete until such time as all sections have been visited in the course of other duties, but it can be said that an examination of twenty-six fields between Ontario and Nyssa, and Ontario and Vale revealed the presence of the larva in every instance. In some fields there were a good many, particularly in the region bordering on the Snake River, while other fields further away from the river contained a smaller number.

**Miscellaneous Service**  
During the course of the work of the month, 11 committee meetings were attended, 9 other meetings, 42 farms visited, 93 calls at the office, 112 phone calls, 10 demonstrations visited, 6 press reports written, 153 letters, and 9 circular letters of 375 copies. The distance covered by the auto was about 1300 miles.
