equate hospital facilities of the county was also shown up in a way that is not complimentary to the county.

The salary plan for the county physician should also be abolished according to one report.

Juvenile delinquents should in all cases have a thorough physical examination when they are brought to the attention of the court.

Enforcement of the state law prohibiting persons under 16 years of age from driving automobiles was also urged, as was the law concerning sale of tobacco to minors.

Various other matters of more or less importance will be embodied in a complete report to be made by the secretary.

**HORTICULTURISTS MEET.**

Coddling Moth Control Studied at Brogan Meeting.

A very successful and profitable meeting of orchardists was held at the Brogan community hall recently, which was arranged by the horticultural committee, with the able assistance of the Brogan ladies. Invitations were sent to all orchardists in the county but owing to the distance to go, the attendance was confined mostly to the Brogan and Jamieson communities. Professor Longley of the University of Idaho, in charge of Coddling Moth control work in that State was in attendance and gave much valuable information.

During the afternoon, a tour of the orchards of the Brogan section was made to investigate conditions and study the emergence of the moths in the cages provided by Messrs. Willis and Reed, and about the trunks of the trees. The many phases of control measures were discussed during the progress of the tour. After the orchards were visited, all hands repaired to the dining room of the community hall and did full justice to one of the best feeds ever sat down to. This was where the ladies gave the able assistance referred to above.

Following the dinner, a discussion of the work was indulged in by all present. Professor Longley gave some very acceptable pointers on methods of control of the coddling moth and other orchard pests. After the coddling moths had been pretty well disposed of, the subject of further cooperation among the orchardists of the county was taken up. It was agreed that the Farm Bureau should be asked to provide the growers with timely information on control measures, and that chairman Reed should confer with the other members of his county committee in effort to get information on markets and prices for the benefit of all the growers.
