PIONEER WOMAN DIES AT AGE OF EIGHTY

Mrs. Mary Frances Tasell passed away Wednesday, June 23, 1920, in this city, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Grace McKnight, after a protracted illness. Mrs. Tasell's maiden name was Mary Frances Isbell. She was born near Aurora, Illinois, October 8, 1840, and was therefore nearing the 80th milestone of life's pathway. At the age of sixteen she went with an uncle to the state of Texas, where she lived several years. In 1860 she removed to California, and followed teaching in the public schools until she met and married Henry Lovell Tasell, November 9th, 1887, when they moved to Linn County, Oregon, where they resided until the death of her husband on November 19th, 1916, after which she came to the home of her daughter in Vale.

While an invalid most of the years spent here, yet she made many friends who will, together with the family, miss her and mourn her loss. She is survived by three children: Mrs. Geo. McKnight of Vale, Burton I. Tasell, Mrs. George Washburn of Portland, Oregon.

The family left Vale Wednesday afternoon, with the remains for Albany, Linn County, Oregon, and burial was in the old family plot there. The funeral services were held in Albany at 2:00 P. M., Friday, June 25th—Vale Enterprise.

MUCH CONSTRUCTION WORK CONTEMPLATED

Reports From State Engineer's Department Show Approximately 240 Miles of Canals Will Be Constructed

According to the Records of Percy A. Cupper, State Engineer, between January 1st and June 1st, of this year, two hundred sixty three permits to appropriate water, and ten permits to construct reservoirs have been issued. Of this number thirteen permits have been granted covering the appropriation of water for power development, amounting to approximately 9300 horsepower, 198 permits covering the appropriation of water for the irrigation of 41,655 acres of land and ten permits covering the appropriation of water for mining purposes. The remaining 43 permits cover domestic use, water for stock, municipal, and various other uses.

Under the various permits it is contemplated that approximately 240 miles of canals will be constructed, and the various features of construction work will cost approximately \$1,600,000.00.

In Malheur County the following permits have been issued:

To H. M. Derrick, of Malheur, Oregon, covering the appropriation of water from Porter Gulch for irrigation purposes.

To Zella McMullin, of Drewsey, covering the appropriation of water from Middle Fork of Malheur River for the irrigation of 8 acres of land.

To David H. Burrows, of Ontario, covering the appropriation of Drainage water for the irrigation of 155 acres of land.

To Russell Maxfield, of Payette, Idaho, covering the appropriation of water from Snake River for irrigation of 207 acres, at an estimated cost of \$2400.00.

To Herwie B. Wood, Ontario, covering the appropriation of water from the Malheur Drainage District for the irrigation of eighty acres.

To C. E. and W. S. Rees, of Ontario, covering the appropriation of waste water from Shoestring Irrigation Ditch for irrigation of eighty acres of land.

To J. C. Brandon, of Vale, Oregon, covering the appropriation of water from North Fork of Burnt River for shortage in the Brandon Reservoir, for irrigation of 200 acres of land.

To Carrie Luce Putnam and Eva Luce, of Riverside, Oregon, covering the construction of the Luce Reservoir for the shortage of 250 acre feet of water from springs and feed canal, for irrigation of forty acres of land.

To P. M. Burtis, of Harper, Oregon, covering the appropriation of water from Jim Owen Creek, for irrigation of 55 acres.

To J. J. Dickerson, and L. L. Dickerson, of Vale, Oregon, covering the appropriation of water from Bully Creek for irrigation of 85 acres.

To Oregon Washington Railroad and Navigation Company, of Portland, covering the appropriation of water from Malheur River for Locomotive supply, at an estimated construction cost of \$8000.00.

To A. L. Guerber, of Jamieson, covering the appropriation of water from a natural water course, for irrigation 15 acres.

To Minnie Brown, of Ontario, covering appropriation of water from Snake river for irrigation of 87 acres.

To M. Gallagher, of Crowley, Oregon, covering the construction of the Gallagher Reservoir for shortage of water from Burnt Flat Creek and side ravine, for irrigation purposes.

To Meryl V. Napton, of Homedale, Idaho, covering the appropriation of water from Snake River for irrigation purposes.

To A. D. Brough, of Nyssa, covering the appropriation of water from Nyssa Arcadia Drainage District for irrigation purposes.

To Mary E. Hubbell, of Jordan Valley, covering the appropriation of water from Crooked River for irrigation of 85 acres.

To Thomas Alcorn, of McDermitt, Nevada, covering the appropriation of water from Hansen Flat Creek for irrigation purposes and domestic supply.

To V. Mendiola, of Riverview, covering the appropriation of water from Owyhee River for irrigation purposes.

To Frank H. Townly, of Vale, covering the appropriation of water from Owyhee river for irrigation of 65 acres of land.

To Malle J. Geeley, and D. D. Johnson, of Jordan Valley, covering the construction of the Geeley Reservoir for 4412 acres feet of water from Rock Creek for irrigation of 1251 acres of land, and domestic supply.

To J. F. Reed, Nyssa, Oregon, covering the appropriation of water from Owyhee River for irrigation of 100 acres of land.

To Francisco Laca, of McDermitt, Nevada, covering the appropriation of water from unnamed stream for irrigation 75 acres.

To A. C. Lee, of Jordan Valley, covering the construction of the Deary Reservoir for shortage of 360 acre feet from Soldier Creek for irrigation of 140 acres of land.

To Wm Weldenman, of Rome, Oregon, covering the appropriation of water from Owyhee River for irrigation purposes.

To Wm L. Schnabe, of Rockville, Oregon, covering the appropriation of water from Mud Hole, for irrigation and domestic use.

To Margaret A. Cummins, of Jordan Valley, covering the construction of the Burns Creek Reservoir for shortage of water from Bogus Creek and flood waters, for irrigation of 125 acres of land.

FARM HOMES FOR SOLDIERS

Washington, (Special correspondence) Chiefly through the efforts of Representative Nicholas J. Sinnott, of Oregon, there was included in the soldiers' additional compensation bill a provision for special aid to soldiers in obtaining farm homes. In answer to the assertion that returned soldiers had no desire to go to the country, Mr. Sinnott read a communication from the reclamation service showing that when a tract of reclaimed land of 10,000 acres was recently opened for settlement, 3,799 returned soldiers filed applications. The provisions of the soldier's additional compensation law would enable soldiers to secure farm homes, with government aid, in any section of the country.

W. C. T. U. President Here

Mrs. Mattie M. Sleeth, Oregon State President of the W. C. T. U., came to Ontario last week, going from here to Westfall and to Nyssa Sunday and at both places delivered interesting and instructive lectures on the work and purposes of the organization.
