MUCH CONSTRUCTION

Reports From State Engineer's De partment Show Approximately 240 Miles of Canals Will Be Constructed

According to the Records of Percy Cupper, State Engineer, between nuary 1st and June 1st, of this January 1st and June 1st, of this year, two hundred sixty three permits to appropriate water, and ten permits to construct reservoirs have been issued. Of this number thirteen permits have been granted cov-ering the appropriation of water for power development, amounting to approximately 9300 horsepower, 198 permits covering the appropriation of water for the irrigation of 41,685 acres of land and ten permits cover-ing the appropriation of water for mining purposes. The remaining 43 permits cover domestic use, water for stock, municipal, and various other uses.
