**RED CROSS OFFERS HOME NURSING COURSE**

Practical Program For Training Women and Girls in Life Saving Methods—Value of Feeding Cannot Be Measured

If you had a sudden sickness in your home, would you know what to do and what not to do while waiting for the doctor?

In case of an epidemic, wouldn't it be worth while to know what protective measures to use to protect your family?

These are some of the things you will learn in the "Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick" classes to be given by the Ontario Chapter of the American Red Cross.

This course consists of fifteen lessons, which will be given in a teaching center to be announced later. There will be no charge except for the text book—which will be 50c. get in touch with the instructor thru members of the local Red Cross Committee or leave their names and addresses in the Red Cross box in the Post Office.

Miss Ada Cresap who has been sent here by Division Headquarters to give this course is a graduate of Johns Hopkins Hospital, in Baltimore, Maryland, and has had experience in training as an instructor in this course in Virginia. She is a woman of personality and ability and brings to her work and to the community an enthusiasm and interest that will mean much to the students who will undertake the course under her guidance. The Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick Course is a part of the national movement of health. The world has been torn by war and epidemics and all countries are making an effort to build up their national vitality. It is worthwhile for women to take this course for in their hands are opportunities for the prevention of disease and on them falls the care of the sick in the home.
