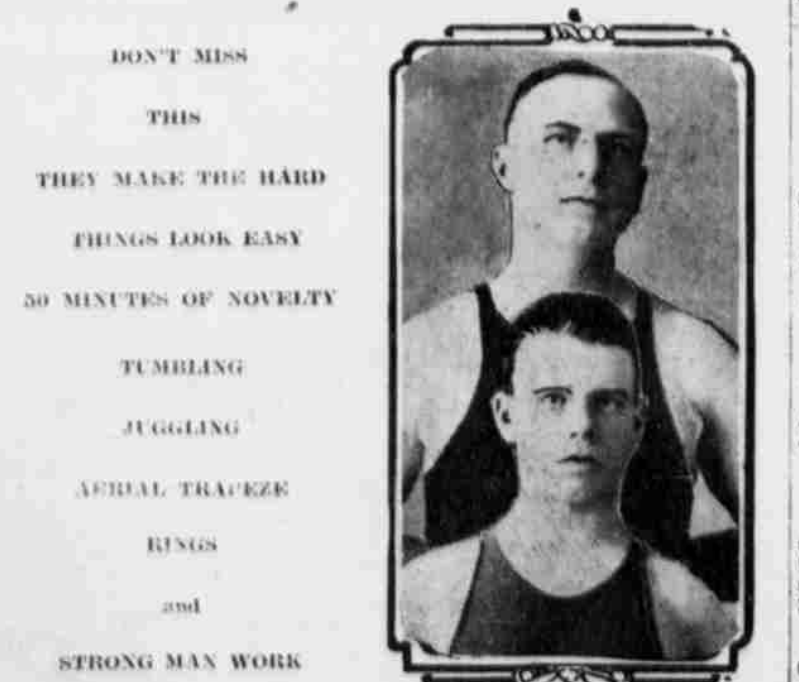

here by hunters seeking the higher Oregon bounty.

It is also noted by many who have studied the situation that the trappers do not bring in the old coyotes who do the damage, specializing in fact on pups who are not old enough to be a menace to the stock on the range.

"We have been able," said Mr. Piper, "to eradicate the coyote as a pest in many states by the poisoning method, and at a far smaller cost than the present system is levying on Malheur county. I am sure that we could rid Malheur county of these animals in two years."

Another meeting will be held in the county soon to which the stockmen and ranchers will be asked to attend to discuss with the government men the County Court and the Farm Bureau executive committee plans for carrying on the campaign in the county.
