

**OREGON NEWS NOTES
OF GENERAL INTEREST**

**Principal Events of the Week
Briefly Sketched for Infor-
mation of Our Readers.**

Threshing of the 1920 grain crop of Linn county has begun.

Mrs. Minnie Cecil Anderson was drowned in the Columbia river at Astoria.

Jackson county cattle men are planning to market their cattle through auction sales.

The Granite road extending from Granite to the Baker county line has been completed.

The manufacture of tile will be a new industry in Albany to be established by the Albany Brick & Tile company.

Lane county has a population of 33,166 in 1920, as compared with a population of 33,783 in 1910, according to a report issued by the census bureau.

Seventy-one acres of land lying adjacent to the city of Coquille was sold by its owner, Mr. Klainer, to E. N. Smith, for a consideration of \$35,000.

With a per capita wealth of \$522.26, Albany is setting forth the claim that few cities in the country can equal the size of its bank deposits pro rata to population.

The Klamath County Woolgrowers' association has decided to levy a tax of 2 cents a head on all sheep owned by members to provide a fund for current expenses.

The Washington County Automotive association was organized at a meeting in Hillsboro Monday night, attended by 28 dealers from all parts of the county.

The entire plant of the Alco Wood Products company at Albany was destroyed by fire, causing a loss of between \$55,000 and \$60,000. The insurance was \$25,000.

George Carille was fined \$100 and costs in justice court at Cottage Grove when he pleaded guilty to a charge of dynamiting trout in the Coast Fork river on the morning of June 6.

Victor Beauregard, owner of a ranch crossed several times by the Columbia river highway, east of Hood River, will remove the pilings which have caused complaint from tourists.

William C. Cunningham, a private in 1st company, coast artillery corps, stationed at Fort Stevens, was found dead at the post and the military authorities believe he committed suicide.

Relics of early days in Lane county and Oregon will be a feature of the exhibits at the county fair at Eugene in September, according to announcement of W. C. Veran, secretary of the fair association.

The Eugene city council has decided to go ahead with the purchase of a municipal aviation field, notwithstanding the fact that there are no bidders for the \$22,000 bonds recently voted for that purpose.

The county court of Jackson county, in conjunction with the state highway commission, is planning to put \$23,000 worth of gravel on the Greenspring mountain road, grading of which is now well under way.

A. P. Walker of Oakland, Cal., was killed in an automobile accident near Wilbur, when an automobile occupied by O. H. Johnson and his wife and Mr. Walker left the road and plunged over the bank 76 feet.

In order to finance the purchase of the site for the proposed naval base site at Astoria to be presented to the government, the Clatsop county naval base company, with a capital stock of \$100,000, has been organized.

At least 500 tons of evergreen blackberries will be handled at the Albany cannery this season. The cannery will begin on the evergreens as soon as the loganberry crop, with which it is now crowded, is out of the way.

Mrs. J. G. Dennis, aged about 45, wife of a merchant at Crawfordville, lost her life in a fire which destroyed her home in that town. The fire also burned the building in which the Crawfordville postoffice was situated.

John D. McGilvary, a granite expert of San Francisco, was in Ashland recently and made an inspection of the granite quarries of this region. He became so much interested that he will return and make a more extended inspection.

Representatives of the Rogue River Valley Fish and Game association will start for the mouth of the Rogue river August 5 to make a thorough investigation of all matters growing out of the Rogue river fish controversy of that locality.

There were four fatalities in Oregon due to industrial accidents during the week ending July 29, according to a report prepared by the industrial accident commission. The victims were Ole Dragavold, sweeper, Bend, William Greashudber, laborer, Oregon City; Newton W. Lewis, laborer, Salem, and A. C. Duncan, logger, Powder. A total of 469 accidents were reported.

**NOTICE OF THE INTENTION OF
THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE
CITY OF ONTARIO, OREGON
TO IMPROVE CERTAIN
STREETS AND AVENUES
THEREIN**

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Ontario, Oregon, did, at its regular session held on August 3d, A. D. 1920, adopt the following resolution.

RESOLUTION

Whereas, public necessity and public interest require that certain streets in the City of Ontario, Oregon, be improved, and

Whereas, the sections to be improved are in bad condition; and

Whereas, the roadways are poorly drained, and become badly rut up and nearly impassable at times due to loose sand, etc.; and

Whereas, it is very desirable to have free mail delivery service in Ontario and before the Government will establish service of that kind upon sidewalks and crosswalks will have to be constructed in the built up residence districts; and

Whereas, many property owners in the district desire to plant trees and lawn in the parking and otherwise beautify the town; therefore be it

Resolved, by the Council of the City of Ontario, Oregon, that the following named streets be improved as a District Improvement:

Main Street from the north line of 3rd Ave. N. W. to the north line of blocks 4 and 5 Riverside Addition.

1st Street N. W. from the north curb line of 3rd Ave. N. W. to the north line of 5th Ave. N. W.

2nd Street N. W. from the north

curb line of 3rd Ave. N. W. to the north line of 9th Ave. N. W.

3rd Street N. W. from the north curb line of 3rd Ave. N. W. to the north line of 6th Ave. N. W.

4th Street N. W. from the north curb line of 3rd Ave. N. W. to the north line of 5th Ave. N. W.

North 1/2 of 3rd Ave. N. W. from the west line of Main St. to the west line of 4th St. N. W.

5th Street N. W. from the north curb line of 3rd Ave. N. W. to the north line of 7th Ave. N. W.

4th Ave. N. W. from the west line of way line of the O. S. L. Ry. to the east line of 5th St. N. W.

5th Ave. N. W. from the west line of way line of the O. S. L. Ry. to the east line of 5th St. N. W.

6th Ave. N. W. from the west line of way line of the O. S. L. Ry. to the east line of 3rd St. N. W.

7th Ave. N. W. from the west line of way line of the O. S. L. Ry. to the east line of 1st St. N. W.

9th Ave. N. W. from the east line of blocks 5 and 7 Riverside Addition to the east line of 2nd St. N. W.

by grading the said streets to the established grade, constructing concrete sidewalks and curbs with crosswalks, graveling sand holes, and constructing proper drainage structures, etc., and does hereby require from the City Engineer plans and specifications for an appropriate improvement of said streets and estimates of the work and the probable total cost thereof, all to be filed in the office of the City Recorder.

And of causing the cost and expense of such improvements to be assessed against the property benefited thereby and liable therefor, and designating Monday the 16th day of August, A. D. 1920, at the hour of 8 o'clock P. M. to be the appointed day and hour, and the City Hall in said City of Ontario be the place for the hearing of objections and remonstrances, if any there be, against such improvements and assessments.

The City Recorder is hereby directed to give notice of the intention of the Common Council, as hereby expressed, by posting notices thereof for the period required by law in at least three public and conspicuous places within the corporate limits of the said City of Ontario, prior to the date set for said hearing, and to publish this notice in the Ontario Argus, a newspaper of general circulation, within the City of Ontario, for at least two publications thereof prior to said date set for said hearing.
