FILINGS CLOSED IN WASHINGTON

Boston.—Some 40,000 investors entrusted a total variously estimated at \$15,000,000 to \$20,000,000 to Charles Ponzi in a money-making scheme which postal officials declared impossible of fulfillment.

Ponzi surrendered to federal authorities, explaining he could not meet his obligations because of the closing of the Hanover Trust company, where most of his funds were deposited. He was arrested, charged with having used mails to defraud.

Edwin L. Pride, the federal auditor who has been going over Ponzi's accounts, has announced that with some accounts still to be examined, he has found liabilities of \$8,000,000. The only clue to Ponzi's assets is his own estimate that they total about \$4,000,000. Charles Brightwell, Raymond Myers and Fred Myers, held on state charges of larceny as a result of the collapse of the Old Colony Foreign Exchange company, which attracted investors with an offer of 100 per cent interest, were held in jail.
