

ONTARIO PUBLIC SCHOOLS OPEN SEPTEMBER 6th, 1920

High School

The Ontario High School will be better prepared to train and educate the young people of this community during the coming year than ever before. All former High School Students and all eighth grade graduates will be especially interested in the following information:

1. An unusually strong faculty, eleven in number, has been selected for the coming year.
2. Forty-six different classes meeting every day offer a great variety of studies.
3. Special school activities open to our students, in addition to the regular class work are; military training for all boys, gymnasium training for all girls, High school band, glee clubs, orchestra, football basket ball and track teams, a reorganized commercial department offering typewriting, shorthand, bookkeeping, commercial geography, commercial law, spelling and penmanship; a teacher training course leading to a certificate, manual training for boys, cooking and sewing for girls, free physical examinations for all students.
4. The high school building has been completely overhauled and repaired. New floors, new seats, and newly kalsomined walls add much to the general appearance.

Grade Schools

The corps of teachers for the grade schools has been selected from trained and experienced applicants from all over the west. The Board of Education has increased salaries liberally in order to get the best teachers possible for the Ontario Schools.

The four upper grades at the West Side School have been reorganized on the departmental plan. Mr. Senseman, the principal will teach all the Arithmetic, Mrs. Deal the language and grammar, Miss Platt the Geography, Mr. Roberts the History, Civics and Physiology, and Mrs. Roberts the Reading in all these grades.

Both grade school buildings have been remodeled and painted on the interior. Three fire escapes have been installed in the West Side School and the main stair way has been made three feet wider.

The entire second floor of the East Side school is being completed and finished up.

Both High School and grade school students should begin making plans now to be on hand the first day of the school year.

IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT

In order that time may be had to advise and help each individual student in choosing a course of study, Thursday and Friday, Sept. 2nd and 3rd have been set aside for this purpose. All high school students will come to the building to enroll and classify according to the following schedule:

Seniors, fourth year students, Thursday 9 to 12 a. m. Juniors, third year students, Thursday 1:30 to 4:30 p. m. Sophomores, second year students, Friday 9 to 12 a. m. Freshmen, first year students, Friday 1:30 to 4:30 p. m. Students need not be present except at the time mentioned.

All Freshmen, or first year students, will be required to study English and Algebra. They must select two other studies from the following: Ancient History, Latin, General Science, Manual Training or Sewing.
