### Grade Schools

The corps of teachers for the grade schools has been selected from trained and experienced applicants from all over the west. The Board of Education has increased salaries liberally in order to get the best teachers possible for the Ontario Schools.

The four upper grades at the West Side School have been reorganized on the departmental plan, Mr. Senseman, the principal will teach all the Arithmetic, Mrs. Deal the language and grammar, Miss Platt the Geography, Mr. Roberts the History, Civies and Physiology, and Mrs. Roberts the Reading in all these grades.

Both grade school buildings have been remodeled and painted on the interior. Three fire escapes have been installed in the West Side School and the main stair way has been made three feet wider.
