Inspect flocks of pure bred Rambouillet and Hampshire sheep and some fine horses. The shepherd will tell about the flocks as Mr. Butterfield will be away at the Salt Lake sheep sale.

Arrive at A. A. Gutteridge farm 4:15 where Oregon Slope community farm bureau will serve something wet. Dewitt Kincaid will exhibit his pure bred Jersey heifer for which he paid \$450.00. The boy will tell about club work and pure bred stock. Raymond Gutteridge's corn club acre will be seen here.

Arrive at Northrup farm 4:45. Inspect flock of grade Hampshire sheep grazed on alfalfa pasture. Mr. Northrup will give his experience with the farm flock and discuss the possibilities of using sheep on pasture on the irrigated farm.

Arrive at Miller and Culbertson dairy farm and inspect herd of grade cows, two large pit silos will be seen here. Mr. Culbertson will discuss dairying from the standpoint of providing a sure market for feed crops.

### NURSE TO TELL STORY OF SIBERIAN SOJOURN

Miss Simmons To Relate Story of War Work—Dr. W. J. Weese Delivers Lecture On Communicable Diseases

Miss Ethel Simmons of the Red Cross nursing corps who is in charge of the home hygiene and nursing classes being conducted by the Red Cross in the chapter field will deliver a lecture on her Siberian experiences at the High School Friday afternoon at 3 P. M. Miss Simmons is doing this at the urgent request of those who have been taking the course, but all who desire to do so are invited to be present, especially those who intend to take the second course of lessons.

Interest in the home hygiene course has increased markedly as the work has progressed and its value the better manifested to those participating. In fact it has been found necessary to schedule a second course for Ontario to start October 1.

Arrangements have been made to start classes at Oregon Slope and Nyssa on September 3. Mrs. W. J. Weese, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. McDonald, Mrs. L. R. Briethaupt and Miss Simmons went to Oregon Slope Tuesday afternoon to arrange for the classes there. The classes will be held twice each week for two hours each so that the work can be completed in four weeks.

### Dr. Weese Lectures

An additional feature of the course was added in Ontario Monday evening when Dr. W. J. Weese, chairman of the local chapter delivered a lecture on communicable diseases, giving special attention to typhoid and scarlet fever, and tuberculosis. Following his lecture the doctor answered questions propounded by members of the class and a very interesting discussion followed. There was a large attendance at the lecture, and appreciation was expressed to the doctor for the opportunity thus furnished to gain added knowledge concerning these vital subjects.
