**NOTICE OF BOND ELECTION and STATE GUARANTY OF INTEREST ELECTION.**

Notice is hereby given that on the 7th day of September, 1920, the Board of Directors of Slide Irrigation District, did pass and adopt a resolution, after the approval of the State Engineer of the State of Oregon first had, whereby it is determined by said Board that it is necessary, and for the best interest of the said district, and the only means whereby the project as outlined and so approved may be financed, that the said district issue, negotiate and sell, for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses of organization of said district, construction of works and system, and maintenance and operation of same, or any one or more of said purposes, its negotiable coupon bonds in the sum of ONE HUNDRED TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$110,000.00), maturing serially in annual amounts approximately equal, principal and interest, in not less than ten years nor more than twenty years after date, interest payable semi-annually at not to exceed six per centum per annum, and that said resolution calls for an election to be held and which will be held within said district, at Lincoln School House, School District No. 29 commencing at the hour of 8:00 o'clock in the forenoon, and continuing until and closing at the hour of 5:00 o'clock in the afternoon, on the 11th day of October, 1920, at which said election will be submitted to the qualified electors of said district the question of whether or not the said negotiable coupon bonds of said district in said sum for the said purposes, or any or all of the said purposes shall be authorized, negotiated, and sold, and at which said election the said qualified electors shall be required to cast ballots containing the words "Bonds—Yes" or "Bonds—No," or words equivalent thereto, and

Notice is further given that a resolution was duly passed and adopted at the above referred to meeting of said Board of Directors, whereby it is determined that it is for the best interest of the said district that request be made for a guaranty of interest on said bonds for a period of the first two (2) years, by the State of Oregon, and that said election, above referred to, that the question of authorizing the Board of Directors of said district to do and perform all acts and things necessary and by law required in procuring the said guaranty of interest on said bonds for said period, be also submitted to the qualified electors of the district, and that pursuant thereto, the said question will at said election be so submitted to the qualified electors for determination;

All files, minutes, plans and specifications and approvals are now on file, and open to inspection at the home of W. D. Patch, the place of business for said Board of Directors.

Notice is further given that as an election board for said election, I Yant, Mrs. W. D. Patch, and L. L. Culbertson were by said resolution appointed, and that said election will at said time and place be held, and the questions so submitted to a vote of all qualified electors of said district.
