RECORD SENT TO COLBY

Tennessee Lower House Requests Action by Governor.

Nashville, Tenn.—At the request of the house of representatives, Governor Roberts forwarded to Secretary of State Colby a certified copy of the Journal of that body, when the attempt was made to rescind the federal suffrage amendment.

The action was not regarded by the suffragists as affecting the validity of the proclamation previously issued by Secretary Colby of the ratification of the 19th amendment.

The anti-ratificationists, however, were jubilant because they interpreted the sending of the statement as meaning that this record would become a part of the evidence to be used in the courts to overthrow the validity of the ratification.

ing a mill for them. What promises to be the final meeting on this matter will be held in the City Hall tonight, at which time it is expected the company to operate the mill will be organized. A meeting was held on this matter in my office on last Saturday night, at which Hans Ott reported he had secured the promises of some 12 to 14 farmers in his neighborhood to financially support the mill with subscriptions to stock. The meeting tonight is for the purpose to organize and take the subscriptions and start the company. Un- were effected whereby Mr. Randall Sage will install his machine on the Seymour Ross place one mile east of Calro at an upset price of four thousand dollars—he taking stock in the company for his mill. The farmers are to raise the balance of the capital which is set at eight thousand dollars, making the capital of the company \$12,000.
