Avery Glesay left last Tuesday for a hunting trip to Kibbles Valley, and returned on Sunday.

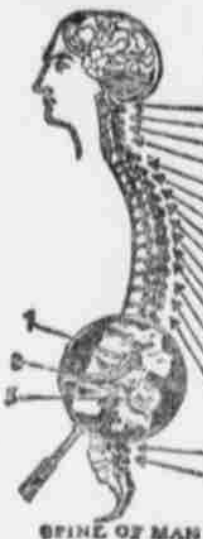
James Graham of Westfall arrived on Friday, after spending a few days in Ontario, for a short visit here.

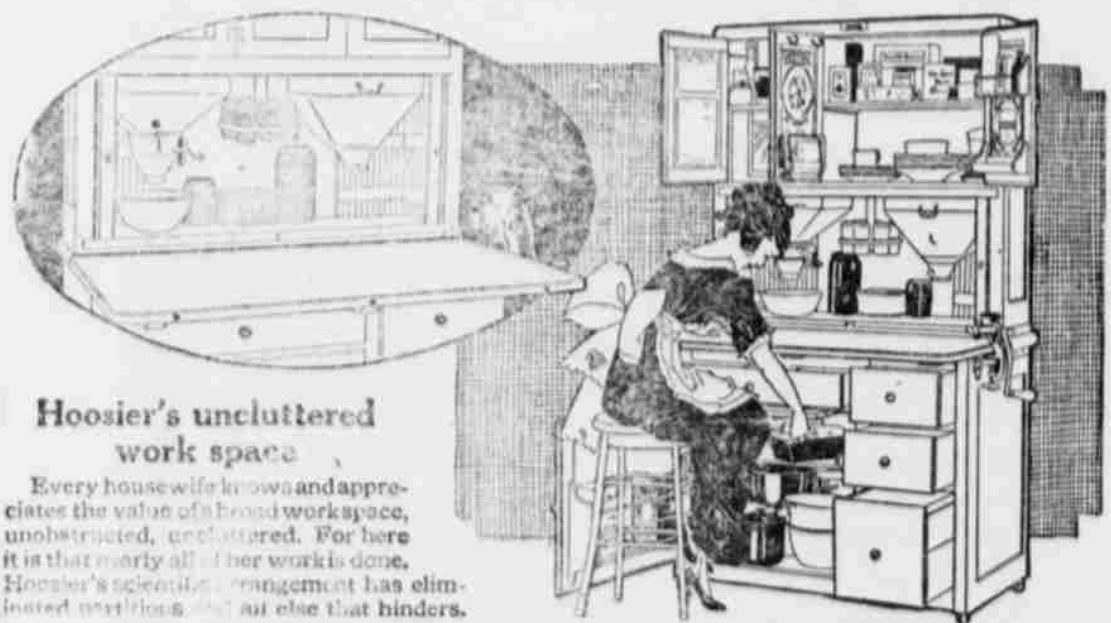
