

KILLS SLUGS

Slugs can be controlled by use of a poisoned bait made of 1 part calclum arsenate to 16 parts chopped lettuce or other succulent on which slugs feed. Spraying the plants to be protected with bordeaux mixture, 4-4-50, in connection with the bait, will insure excellent control, says A. L. Lovett, entomologist at O. A. C.


