five four years ago and demanded as deputy for a little over one year, then went to farming.
Mr. Smith is well known over the county and his entry into the campaign against Mr. Sackett is in all likelihood one of the elements which will enliven the campaign and make the contest a close race.

Rieder Would Be Treasurer
Another of the belated races is that presented in the entry of Frank S. Rieder of Ontario in the contest for treasurer, he having been "written in" at the primaries.
Years ago Mr. Rieder was county clerk of Harney county and has lived in this section for a quarter of a century.

Homan Files Acceptance
After debating at length whether or not to accept the democratic nomination for senator from this district W. F. Homan finally informed the Secretary of State that he would make the race. This in Mr. Homan's case is an evidence of party loyalty for he did not seek the nomination and made no canvass for support. He has not yet determined whether he will make an active canvass in the finals. His opponent is Charles W. Ellis of Burns who defeated Julian A. Hurley and C. M. Crandall of Vale in the primaries for the republican nomination.

Lytle-Swagler
So far the only real campaigning has been done by Robert D. Lytle of Vale who is the republican nominee for district attorney; and his democratic opponent R. W. Swagler. Both these men have been carrying on a personal campaign for many months; that is in a quiet way. This perhaps will be the hottest race of all in the finals next month.

Crall-Hurley
For the office of County Superintendent of Schools another still hunt for votes has been going on between Mrs. Effie M. Crall the republican nominee and Mrs. Julian A. Hurley also of Vale, the democratic candidate who is running for a fourth term.

Two Are Unopposed
So far only two candidates have a clear field; Lee Noe, democratic candidate for Sheriff and P. J. Gallagher republican nominee for representative.

Graham-Carlisle
In listing above the contested offices that of assessor was overlooked. There is a real battle on for the job. Andrew Graham of Juntura is running against Morgan Carlisle the present incumbent. Mr. Graham is in the race despite the circulated rumor that he was not, and while in Ontario discussed the situation with friends and quietly renewed his acquaintances with friends from various sections of the county. Mr. Carlisle has been campaigning for some time so that there will be considerable interest in this contest.

Managers Getting Busy
During the past week managers of both parties got busy soliciting funds wherewith to carry on the battle. The republican request is understood

to limit the contributions of anyone person to \$50, while the democratic request did not specify a limit. However neither of the managers expects such a flood of coin and checks to materially corrupt the electorate of the county. They do hope, however to be able to pay their bills.

There is one other difference between the campaigns of the two parties so far revealed. The republicans are making a straight out and out party campaign with opposition to everything democratic all along the line. The democrats are not stressing party issues at all, and making individual contests of each race. The league of notions is getting scant attention from the local Bourbons. Outside of the local offices the only candidate getting consideration from the democratic workers is Senator Chamberlain. That is the situation today, next week it may be entirely different.

CALCIUM ARSENATE KILLS SLUGS

Slugs can be controlled by use of a poisoned bait made of 1 part calcium arsenate to 16 parts chopped lettuce or other succulent on which slugs feed. Spraying the plants to be protected with bordeaux mixture, 4-4-50, in connection with the bait, will insure excellent control, says A. L. Lovett, entomologist at O. A. C.
