



# STOPPAGE OF WHEAT SALES IS PLANNED

Wichita, Kan .-- The Wheatgrowers asociation of the United States, with a membership of 70,000 in Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Nebraska and South Dakota, has issued from its office here a proclamation to all its memoers urging them to refrain from seiling any wheat after 5 p. m., October 25, until such time as the price of good wheat is raised to \$3 a bushel at growers' terminal market.

Agricultural colleges, farm bureaus, state boards of agriculture and similar organizations are urged to co-perate with the association in its effort to raise the price of wheat.

The proclamation is signed by W. F. McMichael, national president, and W. H. McGreevy, national secretary.
