CHARLIE CHAPLIN BARANDED FOR MALTREATING "WIFE"

Old Lady Sees Filming of "Tillie's Punctured Romance"—Does Not Know That Marie Dressler Is Only Chaplin's "Real Wife"

Charlie Chaplin relates a funny incident in connection with the filming of Mack Bennett's masterpiece comedy, "Tillie's Punctured Romance," which will be shown at the Majestic Theatre on Saturday only, and which features such notable stars as Charlie Chaplin, Marie Dressler, Mabel Normand, Chester Conklin and Mack Swain.

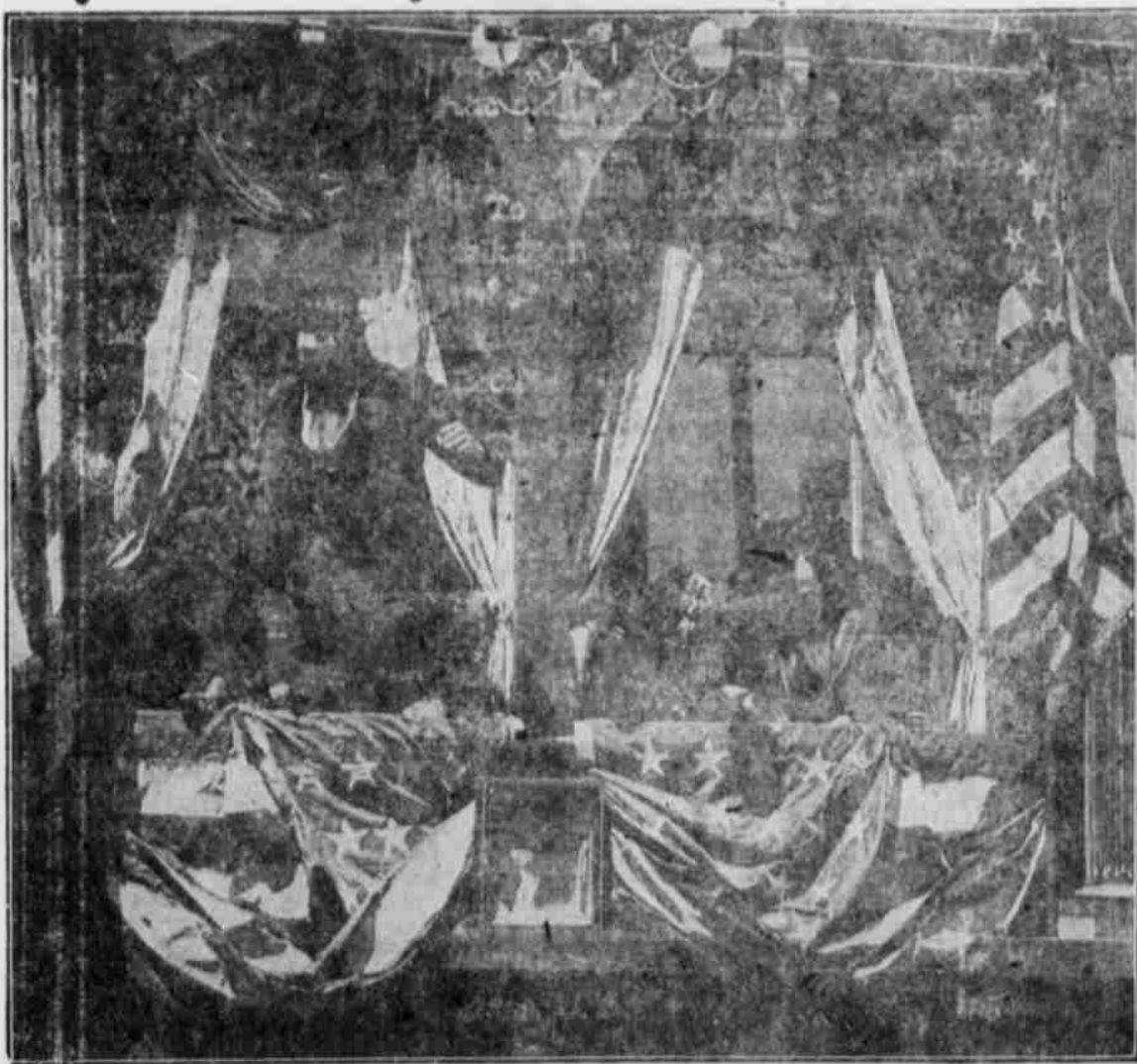
