AMENDMENT TO CITY CHARTER—Shall
Section 27 of the City Charter be amended to
read as follows, to wit:

Section 27. The Mayor of the City of Ontario shall receive such compensation for his services as shall be deemed advisable by the Common Council, not exceeding the sum of \$50.00 per month, and the councilmen shall receive such compensation as they be deemed entitled to, not exceeding the sum of five dollars, (\$5.00), for each regular meeting of said council that said Councilmen shall attend. Provided, however, that if the Mayor shall receive any salary for his services that he shall devote at least two days of each week to the attention of the affairs of said City, and, provided, further, that no councilman shall receive any compensation for any regular meeting at which he is not in attendance.

It is further provided that the Mayor or any member of the Common Council, during the term of his office shall not be interested directly, or indirectly, in any contract, the expense of which is to be paid by the City.

It is further provided that when any member of the Common Council, or the Mayor, is called upon to perform, and does perform, any special duties which require the incurring of any expense, such actual expense may be paid by the City.

NEW SUPERINTENDENT FOR E. O. LAND CO.

W. W. Cryder, Former Superintendent of Malheur Forest Takes Charge of Company's Interests—Makes Headquarters Here.

W. W. Cryder, formerly superintendent of the Malheur forest for the Department of the Interior, arrived in Ontario this week to assume his duties in the new position recently accepted, that of field superintendent for the Eastern Oregon Land Company.

Mr. Cryder will make Ontario his headquarters and will bring his family here as soon as he can find a residence.

In taking his new position Mr. Cryder succeeds H. J. Lorentzen who came to Ontario last November and took charge of the company's properties on January 1.

Thru his long years of experience in handling the Malheur Forest, across which the property of the Eastern Oregon Land company goes on its way from Nyssa to the Dalles, Mr. Cryder is familiar with this section of the state, and with the problems that are to be faced.

Since leaving the service Mr. Cryder has made his home in Pendleton for prior to going to the Malheur forest he was superintendent of the Whitman forest near that city.

FARM BUREAU PLANS IMPORT DAIRY CATTLE

Livestock Committee Investigating Local Demand and Available Stock—Graham Goes To Investigate

"The livestock situation in Malheur county has been the subject of much debate in the meetings of the Farm Bureau executive committee for several months. With an ever increasing supply of coarse feeds on the farms of this section, accompanied by a constantly dwindling demand from range livestock, the problem of increasing the numbers of farm livestock has come to be recognized by the Bureau as one needing attention," says L. R. Briethaupt, County Agent.

"Chairman S. P. Graham of the Farm Bureau livestock committee left on Monday night for various points along the coast of Oregon and Washington. Mr. Graham goes on business of a personal nature, but will avail himself of the opportunity to investigate the available dairy stock in the counties he will visit.

"The Farm Bureau has plans well under way to bring about the importation of dairy stock for the benefit of the farmers of the county.

"These plans contemplate the placing of cattle which are fully inspected for disease and approved as 'o quality by the Dairy Specialist of O. A. C. The price will be kept at the minimum so as to place the cattle on the farms at practically what they cost. The whole matter will be handled by men approved as competent and reliable by the Bureau committee.

"Good dairy cattle offer the most certain returns on the feed consumed of any form of livestock. This is capable of producing exceptionally high yields of hay and ensilage. Alfalfa hay, or clover hay, when fed with ensilage comprise an ideal ration for dairy cows. Unless a production of 50 pounds of milk per day, or more is made by the individual cow, it is hardly of advantage to feed grain when good quality hay and silage are fed."

Both Mr. and Mrs. Howland are well known in this section. Mr. Howland has been a resident of this city for many years, and in all that time connected with the Cash Grain Company of which he is president and manager. He came to this city from Wisconsin, his home there being in Milwaukee. He is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin and served with a Badger state cavalry regiment in the Spanish American war.

The bride is the daughter of a pioneer family of Caldwell and for many years has been a resident of Welser. Thru frequent visits to this city she has made a host of friends in Ontario to add to those of years standing thruout the valley.
