"I took my sewing and cooking to a Community Fair at Bonita and received the first prize which entitled me to a dozen photographs valued at \$20 from the Selligman Studio at Ontario.

"In September I took my sewing to the County Fair at Ontario. You can imagine my surprise and delight on entering the Club booth to find a blue ribbon on my sewing.

"For this prize I received \$5 in cash merchandise to the value of \$2.50, and best of all a free trip to the State Fair at Salem.

"I went to Salem about the last of September, and won first prize there too, on Division I Sewing which gives me a two weeks trip to O. A. C. next summer.

"I am one of the happiest girls in Oregon and glad that I took up the Club work. Even if I had only won second prize I should have tried all the harder for first prize next year."
