FRUITLAND MAN'S DEATH IS HASTENED THRU GRIEF.

Charles C. Powell Well Known Rancher Passes Away — Mrs. Powell's Sudden Death Six Weeks Ago Indirect Cause — Other Fruitland News

Charles C. Powell one of the best known ranchers of the Bench died at his home Monday afternoon. Death was due to apoplexy, with which he was stricken Thursday, November 11.

Mr. Powell was born at Plattsburg, Mo., January 9, 1855. He was married to Jennie A. West, December 22, 1887. Mr. and Mrs. Powell moved from Missouri to Colorado in 1909 and from there they came to Idaho in 1911 and purchased the ranch near Fruitland. Two sons, Harry, who is living near Fruitland on the home place, and Charles K., superintendent of the Poultry Farm of the Oregon State Agricultural College, Corvallis; four brothers, John A. Powell, of Bertrand, Mo., J. L. Powell, Perrin, Mo., M. R. Powell, Long Bench, California and Will Powell, Vernal, Utah; and two granddaughters, Marie and Helen Powell, daughters of Harry Powell, survive. Powell will be missed by a large number of friends and neighbors who know him as a loving father and a good neighbor.

Only six weeks ago Mrs. Powell, wife of the deceased passed away suddenly at Corvallis, Oregon, from heart trouble. Although Mr. Powell has not been well for a number of years it is believed because of the great loss he suffered at her death his death was hastened. He has grieved continuously and longed to be with his loved one who had meant so much to him. Much sympathy is extended the close relatives who have been called upon in such short time to part with both parents. The funeral arrangements have not been made, awaiting word from the relatives.
