Mr. Simmons and family of Midvale, Idaho have moved to the Pennington house on the Boulevard that was recently vacated by Mr. Allen and family.

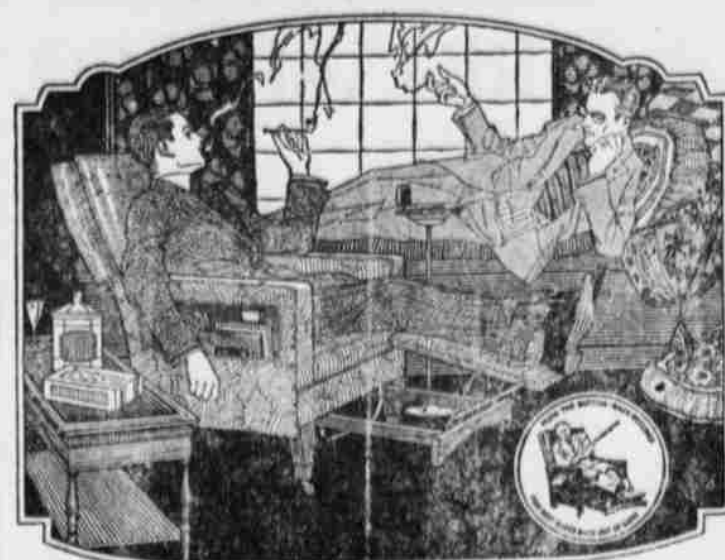
John Zitterkole and sister Miss Lizale, took dinner Sunday with Chas. Bullard and family.

S. W. Barrett and wife, and Sam Henry called on Frank Edwards and family Thursday evening.

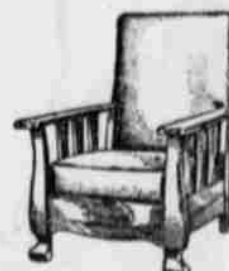

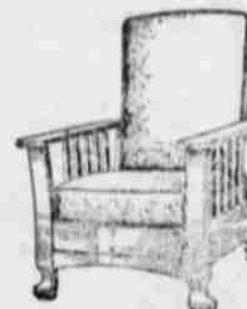
