WANTS "DESERTERS" PUNISHED
Declaring that the "desultory" if not dilatory policy of the Administration in seeking out substantially 150,000 deserters from the military and naval services and slackers during the war has been the subject of much adverse criticism, particularly on the part of the American Legion, Senator Moses, of New Hampshire, has offered an amendment to the House joint resolution which he believes will expedite the punishment of the "undesirables". The amendment provides that the repeal of war legislation embodied in the House resolution "shall not be construed as effective to terminate the military status of any person now in desertion from the military or naval service of the United States, nor to terminate the liability to prosecution and punishment under the selective service law of any person who failed to comply with the provisions of said act."
