Mrs. Victoria T. Schweizer reports two new pupils who are: Merle and Joseph Shadow.

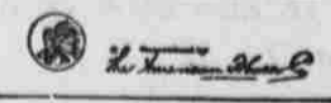

G. W. Dean left Sunday for Portland.

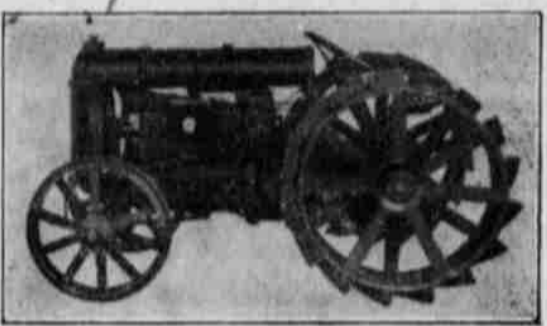
