MALHEUR COUNTY RETAINS ITS AVERAGE AT O. A. C.

Malheur county maintained her average of three agricultural students in the enrollment for the second term. Of the 3524 students enrolled since last September, 881 are agricultural students. The new students to enroll for the second term work in the school of agriculture numbered 153.

The enrollment of federal rehabilitation men for agricultural work increased from 163 the first term to 299 for the second term. A large portion of these men are from Oregon homes, in fact, the only students several of the counties have in the college taking agriculture are these rehabilitation men. All men under the supervision of the federal board of vocational education are maintained in school without any expense to the student or state.
