

NOTICE OF SPECIAL BOND ELECTION

WHEREAS, The Common Council of the City of Ontario, Malheur County, Oregon, did on the 7th day of March, 1921, A. D., duly enact an ordinance numbered 347 of the Ordinances of the City of Ontario, and entitled:

"An ordinance submitting to the legal voters of said City of Ontario, Malheur County, Oregon, for their determination, the question of contracting a bonded indebtedness in the sum of Thirty-eight Thousand (\$38,000) Dollars, and authorizing the Common Council of the said City of Ontario, Malheur County, Oregon, to issue the negotiable Bonds of said City for the aggregate amount of said \$38,000.00 for the purpose of funding the warrants indebtedness now owed by said City, for warrants which have been issued and are now outstanding and unpaid for want of funds, and declaring an emergency"; which said Ordinance was passed by the Common Council at a regular session thereof, on the 7th day of March, A. D. 1921, and was approved by the mayor and attested by the city recorder on said 7th day of March, A. D. 1921, and in which it was provided that a special election of the qualified electors within the city of Ontario be held, for the purpose of submitting to said electors for their determination, the question as in said Ordinance set forth and contained, therefore,

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on the 22nd day of March, A. D. 1921, a special election will be held at the City Hall in the city of Ontario, Malheur County, Oregon, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said city of Ontario, the following question for their determination:

QUESTION:

"Shall the Common Council of the City of Ontario, Malheur County, Oregon, be authorized and empowered to contract a bonded indebtedness in the sum of Thirty-eight Thousand (\$38,000) Dollars, and to issue the negotiable bonds of said city in the aggregate sum of Thirty-eight Thousand (\$38,000) Dollars, to bear date of May 1st, and to bear interest at the rate of Six per cent per annum, and to become absolutely due and payable May 1st, 1931, for the purpose of creating a fund for the payment of warrants of the said City of Ontario, which have been heretofore issued and are now outstanding and unpaid?"

That the polls for said election shall be opened at the hour of eight o'clock A. M. on said 22nd day of March, A. D. 1921, and remain open until the hour of twelve o'clock noon, and be closed until the hour of one o'clock P. M. when the same shall be opened and remain open until the hour of seven o'clock P. M., when they shall close, all on the same day.

That the appointed officers to conduct said election are: Clerks; Tom F. Arnold, W. F. Cochran and Blanch Anderson. S. P. Taylor and J. G. Staples, Sr. Judges.

That all persons over the age of twenty-one years, who are not aliens and who are residents of the State of Oregon, and who have resided within the corporate limits of the City of Ontario, for at least six months next preceding the date of said election, shall be entitled to vote at such special election, and not otherwise.

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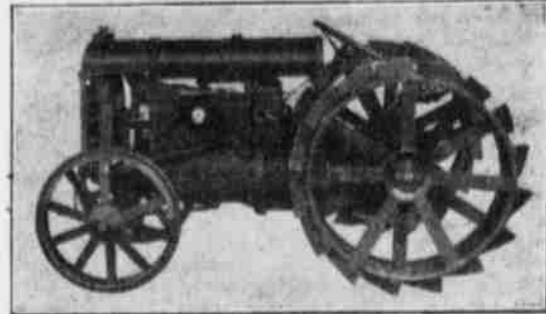

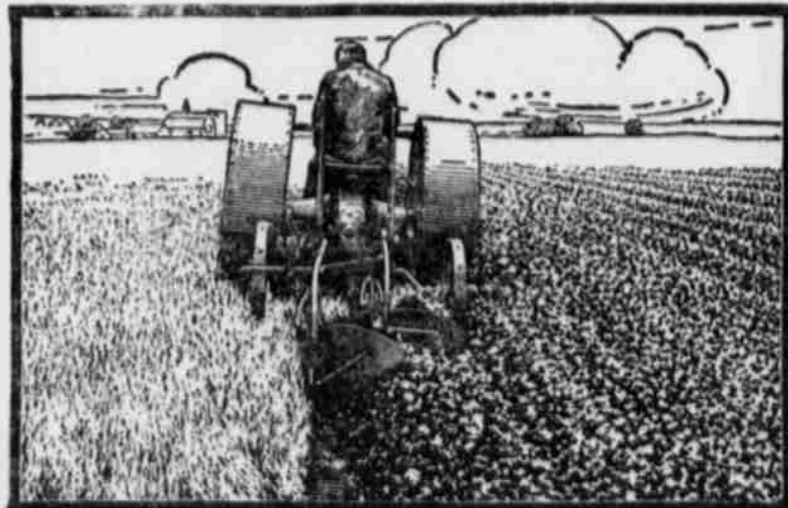
