OUR NATURAL GAS WORTH MILLIONS

The most remarkable fact about the local oil and gas situation, in my opinion, is not that this district has every proof of being a rich gas field with good prospects of oil, but that so many people in the Payette-Outario district are absolutely asleep on the subject and some even opposed to any effort to develop these resources which mean so much to the prosperity and wealth of this dis-

It is strange that every practical oll man and geologist who has visited this district in the last few years, so far as I have been able to find out, including both government and state representatives, have been most enthusiastic over what they say is one of the great natural gas fields of the country, while many of our local residents scoff and laugh at the possibility of our natural gas being valuable.

The only excuse one can make for their attitude is that they have been disappointed so often in investing in highly colored blue-prints vesting in highly colored blue-prints of distant oil fields, which they have never seen, and in the ill-advised prospecting which was done on this district without geological advice years ago, they think every oil or gas proposition is a fake.

Their attitude can also be explain-

ed by a very common trait of human nature which we can illustrate by saying that the grass always looks better in the other mule's pasture. Few people in any community ap-preciate the advantages which lie at their own door-steps. The fishing their own door-steps. The fishing and hunting always looks better fur-

ther up the creek.

People like to invest in an oil prospect in southern Texas, and forget that we have had several flowing gas wells furnishing natural gas right in Payette and Ontario for the past nine years.

I have talked to business men in both towns who have never taken the trouble to walk a few blocks and examine that gas. They have be-grudged a few minutes time to read state and government reports as to the pressure and life of that gas, the development of which would mean so much to their business pros-

perity and land values.

And when some one tries to enliven their interest in gas for local lighting, heating, and power, they say that it is only a small pocket of vegetable gas, or that the well was "saltedd' and the gas poured in the

is only necessary to turn to our State and Government reports, both of which give the gas pressure from 440 to 880 pounds to the square inch, which is from eight to ten times as much pressure of gas now being used commercially in other fields. And the fact that these wells have been furnishing gas for eight or nine years is very good proof that they are not from small pockets of marsh gas and will probably fur-nish gas for many years yet to come


