**MANY SENIORS PLAN FOR COLLEGE COURSES**

**Majority of Class of 1921 at O. H. S. Contemplate Collegiate Work—Varied Careers Considered By Students**

That Ontario is contributing her share of students to institutions of higher learning is shown by the fact that the majority of the members of the high school senior class contemplate further study after graduation this spring. This information was gained through personal interviews conducted by a representative of the Oregon Agricultural College. Of the 24 students in the class it was found that two girls expect to go to normal school, three girls desire a further study in music, two boys want study along the line of pharmacy or medicine, one boy is interested in industrial arts or manual training for teaching, three girls desire specialized training in home economics, five boys anticipate work in some phase of agriculture, two boys desire forestry or some type of engineering, one boy and two girls lean toward commercial work while three girls failed to indicate their expectations concerning higher education.

When it is realized that higher education means a broadening and deepening of personality and the elevation of ideals bringing larger opportunities for happiness and service as well as an actual material value of from \$10 to 15 dollars for the individual for every day spent diligently in school, it is readily seen that Ontario is looking to the future.

Members of the senior class were entertained at a party given at the home of W. L. Turner last week. Alumni and ex-students of O. A. C. were host and hostesses to about 25 persons who enjoyed an evening of dancing, cards and singing.

It is reported that there are at present 17 Ontario students at O. A. C. and that there are three alumni and nine or more ex-O. A. C. students in Ontario.
