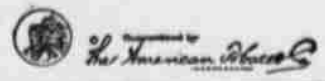

UNCLE TOMMY'S NINETYETH BIRTHDAY TO BE CELEBRATED

A very interesting gathering will be held at the Methodist Church this evening, Thursday, March 10, the occasion being the celebration of Thomas D. Barton's ninetieth birthday.

This hale and vigorous nonagenarian was born at Knoxville, Tenn., March 10, 1831. When 4 year old he moved with his parents to Illinois. The trip was made on flat boats over the Tennessee and Mississippi rivers. T. D. Barton joined Company D, Illinois Infantry in 1861 and after serving over three years under Sherman and Grant was honorably discharged. In 1883 he came to this section of the country and this has been his home ever since. What now is Malheur County was then a part of Baker County. The nearest post office was at Vale or Falk's Store. When Mr. Barton filed on his homestead he had to go to a little settlement called Glen, where Justice of Peace Stilson lived. This was 20 miles up the Willow River and our zealous homesteader made the trip there on foot.

During his long, eventful life Mr. Barton has been a faithful and consistent member of the Methodist Church. He has always been ready and willing to do what he could in the work of the Kingdom of God. In addition to this he has been a cheerful and liberal contributor to the various enterprises of the church as well as to all other worthy causes. At the birthday celebration an interesting musical and literary program will be given congratulatory addresses made, and a splendid life size photograph of the celebrant, (the work and gift of Paul Seligman) will be hung upon the wall of the church. Light refreshments will be served. We all hope Uncle Tommy will be with us to enjoy many more Birthday anniversaries.
