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NOT BACK TO NORMAL
While most of the publicists, and practically all of the leaders in the business world are calling for a return to "normalcy", Secretary of Agriculture Wallace comes forward with a declaration that conditions cannot be expected to return to pre-war conditions.

In fact Mr. Wallace is of the belief that so far as farm prices are concerned they should be 70 per cent above pre-war levels to maintain a proper relation between what the rancher raises and what he has to sell.

Just why he took 70 per cent as the proper measure of increase we do not know, but there will be no disputing the fact that there will have to be an increase in prices if the business of agriculture in this country is to prosper. And if agriculture does not prosper, then none of the rest of the business enterprises in agricultural regions can expect to prosper either.

Of course there are those who argue that since there are more consumers than producers in America they are entitled to the greater consideration. But that theory will not bear the weight of reason. America can not afford to sacrifice its producers at the behest of the consuming public and abandon its agricultural lands to the prey of the foreign farmer.

Neither should the consumer of agricultural products in the East forget that the biggest market for his product is in the agricultural regions of the west and middle west. Every time these sections are hit the east suffers in the curtailment of buying power.

We believe that Mr. Wallace is right and that agricultural products should reach a higher level of prices. To that end when the emergency tariff is passed the Republican party while answering the demand for protection from the dumping of cheap manufactured products, must at the same time rebuke the Eastern manufacturer who asks for tariff free on raw materials.

IT MIGHT HELP
The Oregon Journal in a recent issue put forth a constructive proposition to the public service companies of the State relative to rates and dividends.

In effect the Journal would have the companies adopt the Boston system, a basic rate is named for a given service, and the company on that rate is permitted to enjoy a return of seven per cent on the invested capital. If the company can reduce the rates by efficient management, then it is permitted to pay a higher dividend. With each reduction in cost to its customers the company is permitted higher dividend to its stock holders.

The obvious result would be that a premium would be thus placed on efficiency in the management of such utilities and both the stockholders and the public would benefit.

FIFTH PILES STILL PRESENT

Though there has been a marked improvement in some of the unsightly places about the city since the City Council announced its purpose to compel observance of the health ordinance, yet there is much to be done before Ontario can lay any claim to being a spotless town.

fact that they are adjacent to homes of those who object thereto. Comparatively, these instances are not numerous, but there are enough such that the campaign must not be dropped, if Ontario is to abate the fly nuisance and thus reduce the danger of disease epidemics.

It is almost beyond belief that men who know the danger which the keeping of stock causes to the community should continue the practices which have been permitted in Ontario. If they will not see the light and abate these nuisances voluntarily the council will be compelled to go the limit and invoke the authority of the law. This, however, should not be necessary.

The City Council does not, according to the individual expression of its members, desire to work a hardship on those who want to keep a cow in the city. But it does believe that those who do shall not be permitted to endanger the health of their neighbors by allowing fly incubators to exist on their premises. It is therefore up to those who want to keep cattle in the city to keep their premises clean. This is not an unreasonable request. If the people who do keep stock will not comply with this provision, then they have none but themselves to blame if a more drastic regulation is enforced.


