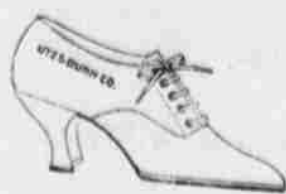

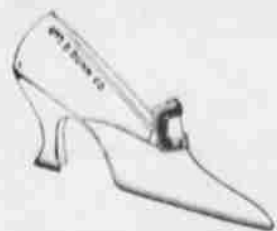

LOCAL PERSONALS

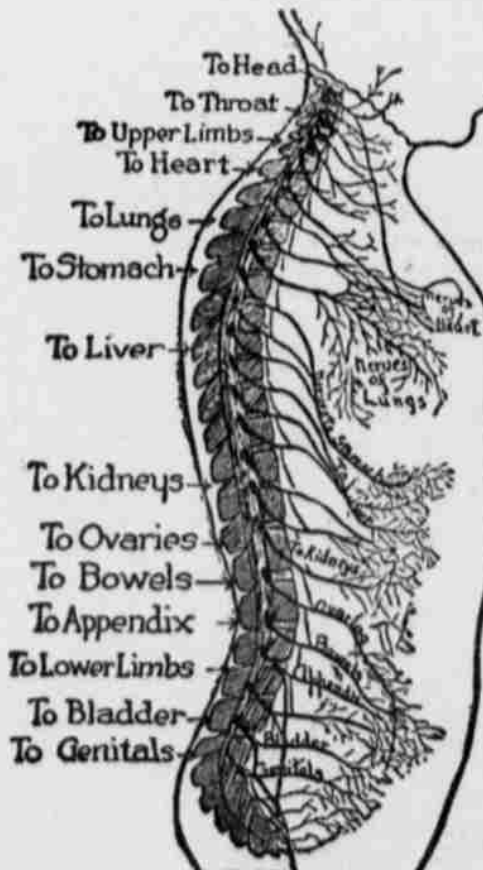
