NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IM-PROVE CERTAIN LOTS, BLOCKS AND PARCELS OF GROUND IN THE CITY OF ONTARIO MAL-

HEUR COUNTY, OREGON Notice is hereby given the regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Ontario, Oregon, held in the City Hall, on the 4th day of April A. D. 1921, at 7:30 o'clock P. M., the following reclution was adopted:-

"RESOLVED, by the Common Council of the City of Ontario, Maiheur County, Oregon, That it is ex pedient and necessary and for the best interests of the citizens of Ontario, and the owners of the following described property, that a system of irrigation be installed by the said City Council for the purpose of supplying an adequate amount of water for the irrigation of gardens, lawns, trees and shrub-beries, thereupon and adjacent to all of the Lots and Blocks hereinafter described, and be it further resolved, that whereas, at the present time, there is no adequate or sufficient system or plan for irrigating and improving any of the following
