ONTARIO-CAIRO LANDOWNERS WANT GOPHERS DESTROYED

A meeting of landowners called by P. Sundquist, pest control commissioner of the Cairo farm bureau, was held on March 30 at the Cairo Grange hall for the purpose of deciding on some move to get concerted action against the pocket gopher pest. After discussing the matter fully, a motion prevailed favoring vigorous action and Mr. Sundquist was instructed to see that all landowners were notified to kill gophers. The motion also provided that those who failed to take care of the pest but allowed them to increase to the detriment of the neighbors, should be treated under the provisions of the rodent law upon the filing of a complaint by persons damaged.

SQUIRREL POISON DEADLY

Persons who have obtained some of the ground squirrel poison being distributed by the farm bureau and used it, report great success. One man near Malheur, who used the poison last year also, reported that he killed hundreds of squirrels with the first application. Two tons of this poison was prepared recently by E. E. Horn of the Biological Survey, working with the agricultural agent. The poison is made up according to a formula that calls for a number of ingredients not ordinarily used in the home made dope. It contains strychnine alkaloid as the death dealing ingredient, the taste of the strychnine being overcome by use of saccharine, syrup, salt, glycerine, baking soda and other ingredients. Nearly half of the two ton lot has already been distributed by the farm bureau.
