Every person, firm, co-partnership, company, or corporation re-siding on, owning, leasing, occupy-ing, possessing or having charge of or dominion over any land, ditches, canals or other property.

FORMULA FOR POISONING
POCKET GOPHERS
Recommended by U. S. Biological
Survey and Extension Service of
the Oregon Agricultural
College
Secure one-half owner Formula 1

coat each grain.

Introduce bait into the gopher runway by probing with a sharpened stick between the mounds. When the runway is located, drop one or the Oregon Agricultural
College
Secure one-half ounce Formula 1
B special strychnine, or in lieu thereof, grind together in a mortor:
1-8 ounce powdered strychnine alkaloid, 1-10 ounce saccharine.
Cut four quarts of sweet potato. parsnip or carrot baits one-half inch square and one inch long and sprinkle the above powder over them, stirring until each bait is coated thoroughly.
A bait may be also made for spring use particularly, by mixing the above quantity of poison with one-half plut of thin starch paste and applying the same to two quarts of wheat in a manner to


