He recommended that two or three test wells be drilled in this three test wells be drilled in this section to a depth of 2500 feet, if necessary, to thoroughly explore the field. that the oil indications are of a petroleum base with a high specific gravity.

R. N. Bell, for many years State Mine Inspector of Idaho, in conjunction with Duwulda of the United States Geologic Survey, have made a thorough study of this region and are very enthusiastic over the possibility of natural gas in commercial quantities, between commercial quantities, between Weiser and Nyssa on the anticlines on both sides of the Snake River. Mr. Bell delivered an address to the Mr. Bell delivered an address to the citizens of Weiser and to the Elks Club of Boise on this subject and is very favorable toward a thorough test of the local field.

J. H. Youngken, a competent oil expert of Okishoma and Montana, has made a thorough study of the local situation and is very atrongly impressed with the possibil-ities of oil and gas here. He will return from Montana in the near future and assume charge of the

future and assume charge of the drilling operations for the new corporation, which hopes to commence drilling operations by June 15th.
