The field vetch aphid is beginning to show up in serious numbers in some fields in the Willamette valley. No satisfactory method has been developed for the control of the pest, but specialists are at work on the problem at the present time. Growers bothered with this aphid should notify the experiment station so that we may keep them informed of any possible methods developed for control.

VALUABLE INFORMATION FOR FEEDERS BEING GATHERED

Union Experiment Station Tests Cattle and Sheep Feeding Rations To Determine One Most Economical

Whether the hay and ensilage farmers of Eastern Oregon find a market for their hay, and whether the producers of range cattle and sheep get the most for their feeders, depends on just one thing: Profitable Feeding. If cattle and sheep can be fed profitably in the sections adjoining the ranges, Oregon hay, ensilage and grain will be fed and fat stock marketed from Oregon. It is a matter of much concern to all persons who are interested directly or indirectly in the prosperity of Oregon.

Realizing this, the Union Branch Experiment Station began feeding experiments a number of years ago to test out the comparative values of different kinds of hay, of ensilage, grain, shelter, warming water etc. At the time this work was started, feeding was practically confined to hay alone, which has been found to be uneconomical in many instances. A proper combination of other feeds with the hay in order to provide a cheaper ration with consequent increase of profits, was the problem of the Station.

Results from the work of the first ninety days feeding of 7 lots of steers and 9 lots of yearling calves, each getting a different ration has just been completed. A report of this work is available by writing to the Superintendent, Robert Withycombe, at Union. One of the most interesting comparisons brought out is that of the gains made when feeding three kinds of ensilage with alfalfa hay. Steers fed on corn ensilage and hay made an average gain of 1.3 pounds per day, compared to 1.2 for barley-pea ensilage and hay and .9 pound for sunflower ensilage. The same ratio practically was maintained in a similar experiment with calves. Alfalfa hay and corn ensilage was the best of all rations from an economical standpoint. Hay alone was not fed. Previous tests having shown that it is not comparable with a ration of hay and ensilage in producing good daily gains and the cost of feeding is much higher. The station does not encourage greatly increased feeding of steers, but believes that the present scale of feeding could be done much more profitably if more attention was given to choice of feeders and the rations fed them.

FARM BUREAU MARKETING COMMITTEE HOLDS MEETING

The marketing committee of the Malheur County Farm Bureau met at the Ontario office of the bureau on Tuesday in an all day session, for the purpose of consulting with Paul Mehl, marketing specialist, relative to plans for the co-operative marketing of Malheur County farm products. The committee is headed by Pete Tenson of Nyssa and has a member from each community in the county that has organized a local bureau. Beside Mr. Tenson, the members present were: G. W. Deag, of the Cairo bureau, J. E. Brown of the Oregon Slope bureau, and K. A. Herrett of the Vale bureau. The committee laid plans for the handling of several of the most important products, through affiliation with statewide associations now organized, or to be organized. The farm bureau marketing committee will not attempt to do any actual marketing business, but will study the merits of various plans for so doing and make recommendations to the farmers of the county. The committee has held a large number of meetings during the past twelve or fifteen months, in consideration of the needs of the farmers along marketing lines. If the farmers of the county will await the recommendations of this representative committee before trying up with any particular scheme, they will probably be greatly benefitted, because the committee has sources of information regarding the merits of the various plans for the handling of farm products, not so directly available to everyone.

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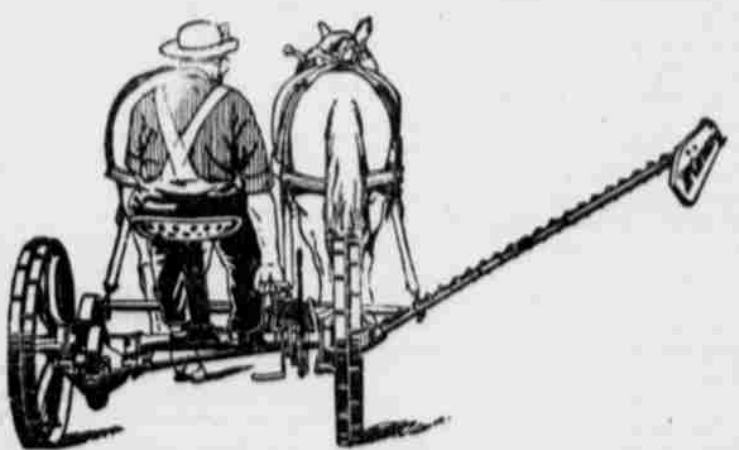

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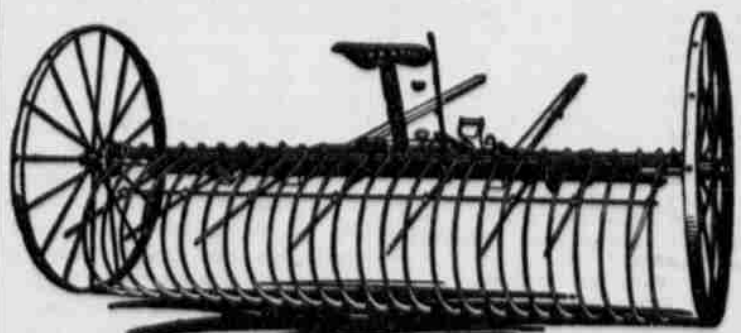
