They will be promoted only one-half grade, however instead of one-full grade. The new plan can best be explained by example. A pupil who is in the fifth grade and has done satisfactory work will be pro-moted this spring to the B6 grade. Next year at the middle of the year he will be promoted to the A 6 grade. Parents will therefore re-member that hereafter B6 does not mean the B class in the sixth grade, but it means the first half of the sixth grade. Since the grat ma-jority of this years grade pupils will be promoted to the B grades next fall, this explanation is made so that parents will not mistake these promotions to mean the B class in that grade.

The advantages of the new plan

The advantages of the new plan are many. Strong pupils can sometimes be given a special promotion of one half a grade. Weak pupils can be required to do onehalf of a years work over without being required to do a whole years work over. Students who are compelled to miss two or three months of school for good reasons can earn one half years credit without having it all to do over. It will be much easier to classify pupils coming to Ontario from outside schools. After the plan has been in effect After the plan has been in effect for some time eighth grade classes will enter the high school twice each year.

SPECIALIST TELLS OF CO-OPERATIVE PLANS

Ranchers of County Flocking To Lectures on Latest Phase of Agricultural Marketing Devel-opment—Interest is Keen

Paul Mehl, field agent in marketing for the Oregon Extension Service completed a series of lectures givcommunities of the county last Tues day evening, when he explained the principles of successful cooperative sixty persons at the Park school house on Oregon Slope. Altogether, between four and five between four and five hundred persons have taken the opportunity to hear Mr. Mehl give his lecture, and it is safe to say that these people have a much cleaner idea of what goes to make for success or failure in cooperative marketing ventures would than they otherwise

Owing to economic conditions which have placed the farmers of the country in general in serious financial straights, there is a great wave of sentiment coming on in favor of cooperative marketing. This is bound to result in various attempts, both sound and unsound, being made to build up farmers' marketing organizations. Given pro-per guidance much good can result both for farmers and for business-men, particularly the businessmen of the West. Without this guidance however, many ventures are certain to be made which will only result in great losses to all concerned. Mr. Mehl is particularly qualified by experience and training to give the basic principles upon which all such ventures should be founded.

The people of the county able to secure the services of spec-ialists on various subjects of im-portance in the development of portance in the development of agriculture, through the activities of the county farm bureau and county agent service. The farm bureau organization determines the needs for such service and arranges for it, calls meetings of the people and otherwise performs the services necessary to the success of the work. 
