

OREGON FRUIT CROP TO HAVE GREAT MARKET

Survey of Other Sections Indicates Rival Yield Cut In Half By Recent Cold Weather Spells

Telegram Washington Bureau WASHINGTON, May 3—There will be tremendous demand for the tree fruits of Oregon this year because of the crop failure in other parts of the United States. Senator McNary today confirmed reports that the crops in Oregon of apples, peaches, pears and other tree fruits are heavily set and the yield in the great Rogue River, Hood River and Willamette valleys will be at or above normal.

In a few days the bureau of market estimates of the agricultural department will issue a survey of the tree fruit crop of the country and will report that generally but half a crop may be expected. It will show that in the plains states as far west as the Rocky mountains there has been great damage to tree crops and that in the states of New England, Atlantic Coast and Great Lakes the crop has been badly injured.

The total appraisal of the country by the bureau of markets will be half a crop for the fruits which Oregon will produce so bountifully.

STUDENTS IN COUNTY FAIR CREATE SMILES

Burlesque Parade and Carnival Attract Crowds and Create Fun—Financial Success Scored By Aggie Student Stunts

All night last Thursday night the students worked on their fair only to see the high wind of Friday morning blow down the results of the work. In spite of the wind the students braced themselves again and soon the tents were up and preparations for the fair were under way. At one thirty the "Peerode" left the fair grounds. Those who saw it pronounce it one of the best parades ever seen in Ontario streets. It consisted of two bands and a number of floats. One of the most humorous floats was the one of the barrellomobile and another equally as good was the man car. Other good floats were the "prairie schooner," "going to the Fair," "Oregon Fruit" and the Educational Exhibit float. Immediately after the fair the baseball game between the Ontario High School and the Nyssa teams proved very interesting. Nyssa won by a 5 to 4 score. The largest crowd ever witnessing a high school baseball game attended.

At seven o'clock in the evening the carnival began with the usual carnival band playing in trowper style. From one show to another the band lead the crowd until everyone had been lulled into the shows. All the shows were of the burlesque variety and the good humor and spirit of good nature which was shown by the crowd indicated the good time that was enjoyed. One of the most popular shows was the Mack Sennot Bathing Beauties. Other shows which drew good crowds were the Minstrel and the Battle Royal. The center of attraction tho was the Yellow Dawg Saloon and the Greasy Spoon Eatin' Joint. Many a hot dog was washed down by soda pop, buttermilk or lemonade. Of course the famous brass rail was present.

The Educational exhibit was well patronized. This exhibit included the handling of farm veterinary tools, farm shop work, reference material from which farmers should keep posted on the latest ideas of handling their produce, samples of food, rations for various types of animals doing various types of work, practical stock judging, separating and handling of milk, and several other interesting topics. The work of the Department was well illustrated and showed the value of agricultural training. Financially the fair was a success. Approximately \$200 was taken in which after paying expenses will net about \$150. This money will be used to send the stock judging team to Union Oregon in June to compete with other Smith-Hughes schools.


