

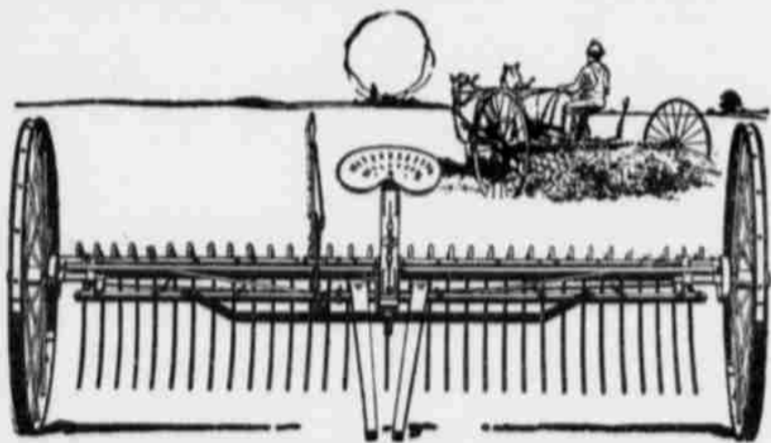

YOUNG TOMATO PLANTS SUSCEPTIBLE TO INJURY

Tomato plants after being transplanted to the garden are subjected to various things that cause them to be handicapped in their growth, say the O. A. C. Experiment station specialists. They should not be transplanted into the field until the weather has settled and there is no more danger of frost unless they can be covered at night. If set out in April or early May they are subjected to cold winds and rain.

The plants are also subject to injury by two insects which can readily be controlled. The cut worm can be checked by the placing of a poisoned bran mash around the plants, and the flea beetle by dusting the plants with powdered arsenate of lead or the "one-in-all" dust.

COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT'S REPORT FOR APRIL

This report covers four weeks during which the main projects given attention were marketing, farm records and pest control. Several other projects were given attention and a large amount of routine work attended to.

Marketing
The marketing committee of the Farm Bureau held a meeting on the 25th to confer with Paul Mehl, marketing specialist, concerning advisable procedure for the cooperative marketing of several leading farm products grown in the county. Specific recommendations were made for marketing of poultry products and wheat, and plans suggested for dairy products, hay, wool and potatoes. A special committee of three was appointed to handle the pooling of wool and lambs.

Upon invitation of the Idaho poultrymen, a committee composed of Chairman Tensen of the marketing committee, chairman Cuts of the Poultry committee, Paul Mehl, marketing specialist, U. L. Upson, manager of the Pacific Poultry Producers association and the county agent, attended a poultry marketing conference at Boise on the 30th. The result of this meeting was the appointment of a committee, one member from each interested county, to ascertain the demand for a poultry marketing organization, secure figures on the number of hens in the territory, and otherwise attend to the preliminary work necessary in bringing about such organization. The general sentiment seemed favorable to organization of southeast-Oregon with southwest-Idaho into a branch of the Pacific Poultry Producers.

Other important work along marketing lines consisted of a series of educational meetings where Paul Mehl lectured on the "principles of successful cooperative marketing." In all, nine such meetings were held, only the first five of which came during the period covered by this report. These meetings were well attended and the subject matter presented was highly appreciated by those who were present. The result should be to make the farmers of the county better able to judge regarding the merits of various cooperative marketing schemes when presented to them.

Farm Records
Work in this department consisted chiefly in the compilation of a mass of data secured during the winter, showing 1920 financial returns from 82 irrigated farms under projects using electrical power for pumping purposes. R. V. Gunn, farm management specialist, spent about a week on this project, tabulating the figures shown on the individual reports. The completed report shows many facts concerning farm business in the Snake River valley of value in connection with marketing and production projects and other work of the farm bureau.

Pest Control
Work in this department consisted of distribution of poisons by sale as provided for through the revolving fund account; completion of the experimental work in gopher poisoning by the Biological Survey, the result of which was favorable to a wheat bait treated with Piper's special strychnine stuck on with starch paste; publication of notices to exterminate pocket gophers; and the filing of a request with the Biological Survey for assistance in controlling groundhogs in the Malheur community.

Soil Improvement
Chairman Russell and committee-man Carman of the committee on soil improvement made progress with collections for local support for the experimental drainage and alkali work in progress near Vale under the supervision of the Department of Soils of Oregon Agricultural College. This work is making good progress and the method used to dig the canal by use of water promises to be an experiment which alone is worth many times the cost of the entire project.

Other Project Work
Some time was devoted to livestock improvement work by giving assistance to the Adrian Bull Association. A test of Tangier peas was arranged by placing seed furnished by the Crops Department of the Agricultural College with chairman Fry of the crop improvement committee for trial. One day was spent at the Union Experiment Station to study the results secured there in experimental feeding tests on steers, calves and sheep. The Horticultural committee held a meeting on the 27th to discuss work for the season. F. L. Ballard, Assistant County Agent Leader met with the farm bureau executive committee on the 9th and spent some time in conference with the county agent.

Miscellaneous
The routine work during the period of this report consisted of attending 6 committee meetings; 5 farm bureau educational meetings, and 3 other meetings; 14 farm visits were made; 3 demonstrations were visited; monthly reports and farm bureau news written; 96 personal business letters and 42 circular letters of 540 copies written; 15 articles for the press written; 117 persons called at the offices on business; and other miscellaneous work impractical to record, performed.

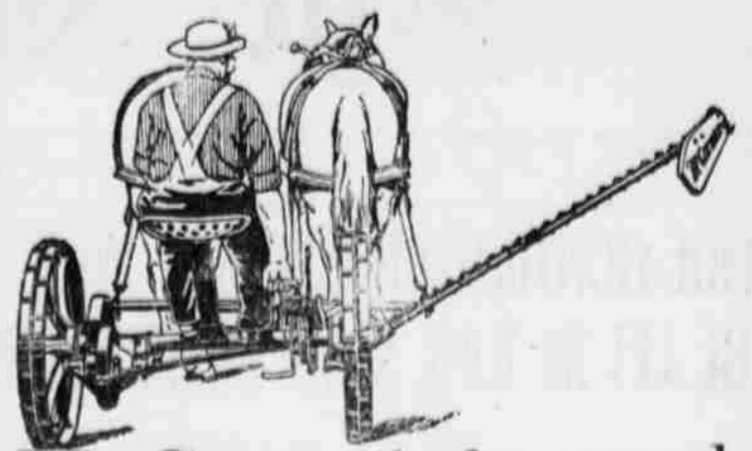

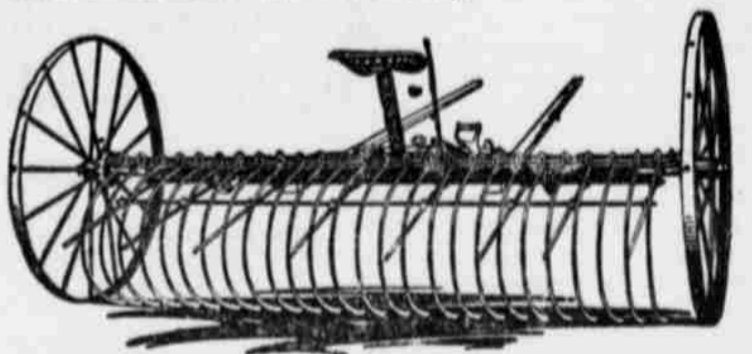

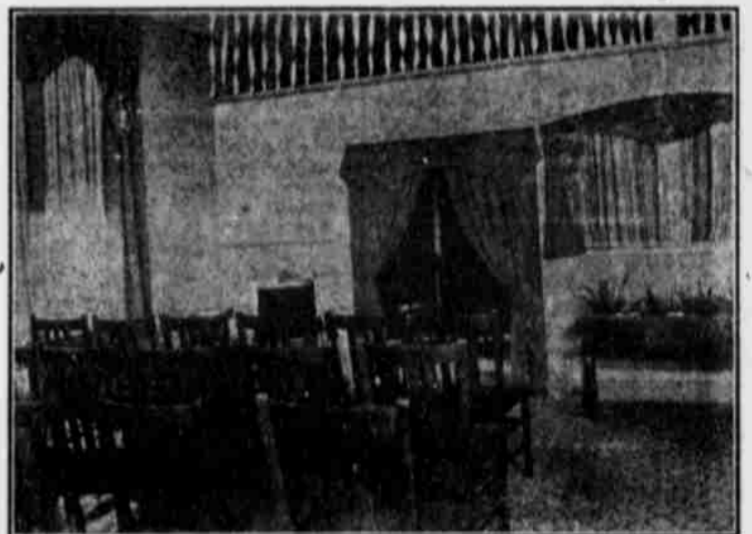
