

**CASE DROPPED WHEN BOYS REPUDIATE FIRST STORY**

District Attorney R. D. Lytle moved to dismiss the case against Ross and Reese Jenkins which was to have been heard Tuesday afternoon before Judge C. M. Stearns and in doing so made this explanation:

"The case was brought on the signed affidavits of Frank Johnson and Francis Zimmerman who declared that they had secured hard cider at Jenkins Pool hall. When before the hearing they informed me that Zimmerman had signed a counter affidavit repudiating the first statement, and that Johnson would testify to a degree differently than his signed statement indicated, there was nothing to do but drop the case.

"However, we are to continue our campaign to stop traffic in liquor in this county and since we have found that one cover of the liquor trade is the punch board they are to go in this county. Their use is absolutely contrary to the law."
