Notices of Farmers Meetings—Sales of Farms and Other Matters of Peculiar Interest to the Ranchers

Hay Harvest Begins
Several farmers in the Ontario-Nyssa section were busy during the early part of the week cutting hay. By the first of next week, haying will be on in earnest. The first crop will not be up to average, some of it being damaged by hail and some by the weevil.

Agricultural Office Popular
An average of twelve to fifteen persons make direct use of the county agricultural agent every working day. Of these, about one third call in person, one half ask for help by mail and the others use the phone. This is side-line work, as the agent carries out most of the work by holding meetings of the farmers, either in committee or by communities, in order to reach greater numbers.

Farm Bureau Committee to Meet
The executive committee of the county farm bureau will hold its regular monthly meeting on Saturday at the city hall in Ontario.

A. F. B. F. Conducts Referendum
The American Farm Bureau Federation has called a referendum vote of sixteen propositions affecting the economic life of agriculture. Every farm bureau community in the U. S. will be called upon to express a view on each proposition so that the officers of the organization may know what the farmers believe should be done before taking definite action. This is a truly democratic way of going at things.

Poultry Meetings Coming
The poultry products marketing committee which has been in charge of the preliminary work to make it possible for poultry men of South-east Oregon and South-west Idaho to sell their products through a co-operative association such as the California, Washington and Western Oregon producers have, will arrange for several meetings during the week of June 20 to 25. U. G. Up-

son, manager of the Pacific Poultry Producers Association has been secured to speak to the producers and will explain all about the workings of the organization and the results obtained. One meeting will be held in each of the counties interested.

Basic Prices Compared
According to Secretary Hoover of the Department of Commerce, compared with a basis of 100 for 1913, present farm produce prices are 109; farm meat animals are 123; all commodities, 162; building materials, 212; house furnishings 276; railway rates, 168; clothing, 192. He says, "certainly these levels must come into step or the agricultural industry and its standards of living will be undermined."

NOTICE
On May 25th, 1921, it became illegal for any person to sell in the state of Oregon a bull of dairy breed for breeding purposes unless he has a license. This act was passed by the last session of the Legislature, and the Dairy Department of the Oregon Agricultural College is made the Dairy Bull Registration Board. The provisions of the act are as follows:
1. No person can offer for sale for dairy breeding use, any dairy bull that is not registered and licensed to be sold for such purpose.
2. A Dairy Bull Registration Board is created for the purpose of registering these bulls.
3. In order to secure a license, the owner of the bull must make application for the same to the Dairy Bull Registration Board and must furnish with the application the certificate of registration of the bull.
4. He must also furnish a certificate which he makes out himself showing that the bull is to the best of his knowledge and belief free from any contagious or infectious disease.
5. A license fee of \$1.00 is provided to cover the cost of administration. The College receives no appropriation to cover the cost of work of this kind.
Upon receipt of these articles properly filled out the Dairy Bull Registration Board will issue a license authorizing the sale of the bull.
Full information, blanks etc., are now available and can be had upon applying to Ass't. Co. Agent, Wellman, Vale, Oregon, or to the Dairy Bull Registration Board, Corvallis, Oregon.

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
