NOTICE TO WATER USERS

TO ALL PERSONS, firms and corporations, claiming a right to the use of the waters of, or owning or being in possession of lands bordering on and having access to, OWYHEE RIVER, or any tributary thereof, and

TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You and each of you are hereby notified that, pursuant to an order of the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Malheur County dated September 22, 1919, and filed in the office of the State Water Board, January 12, 1920, transferring the cause of Owyhee Ditch Company, a corporation, plaintiff, vs. Fred Klingback et al defendants, to the State Water Board for a determination of the relative rights of all claimants to the use of the waters of Owyhee River and its tributaries, the State Engineer of the State of Oregon will begin an investigation of the flow of the above named stream and its tributaries, and of the ditches diverting water therefrom, on Monday, the 1st day of August, 1921.

And you are hereby further notified that the State Water Superintendent of the State of Oregon will commence the taking of testimony as to the rights of all parties claiming water from said stream or its tributaries, as follows:

On Tuesday, the 2nd day of August, 1921, in the Circuit Court Room of the County Court House at Vale, Oregon.

On Wednesday, the 3rd of August, 1921, in the City Hall at Ontario, Oregon.

On Friday, the 5th day of August, 1921, in the Hall of the Jordan Valley Hotel, at Jordan Valley, Oregon.

For a period of 30 days beginning on Monday, the 15th day of August, 1921, at the office of the State Water Superintendent at La Grande, Oregon.

Statements and proofs of claimants will be taken on each of said days at the places aforesaid from the hour of 9 o'clock A. M. to 12 M., and from 1 P. M. to 5 P. M.

And you are hereby notified to appear before the said State Water Superintendent at one of the times and places above mentioned and submit proof of your claim to the waters of said stream or any tributary thereof, if any right thereto is claimed by you for any purpose; and you are hereby further notified that if you fail to so appear and submit proof of your claim to the waters of said stream or tributary thereof, default will be entered against you and you will be barred and estopped from subsequently asserting any right to the waters aforesaid, and will be held and deemed to have forfeited all right to the use of said waters theretofore claimed by you.

NOTICE

On May 25th, 1921, it became illegal for any person to sell in the state of Oregon a bull of dairy breed for breeding purposes unless he has a license. This act was passed by the last session of the Legislature, and the Dairy Department of the Oregon Agricultural College is made the Dairy Bull Registration Board. The provisions of the act are as follows:

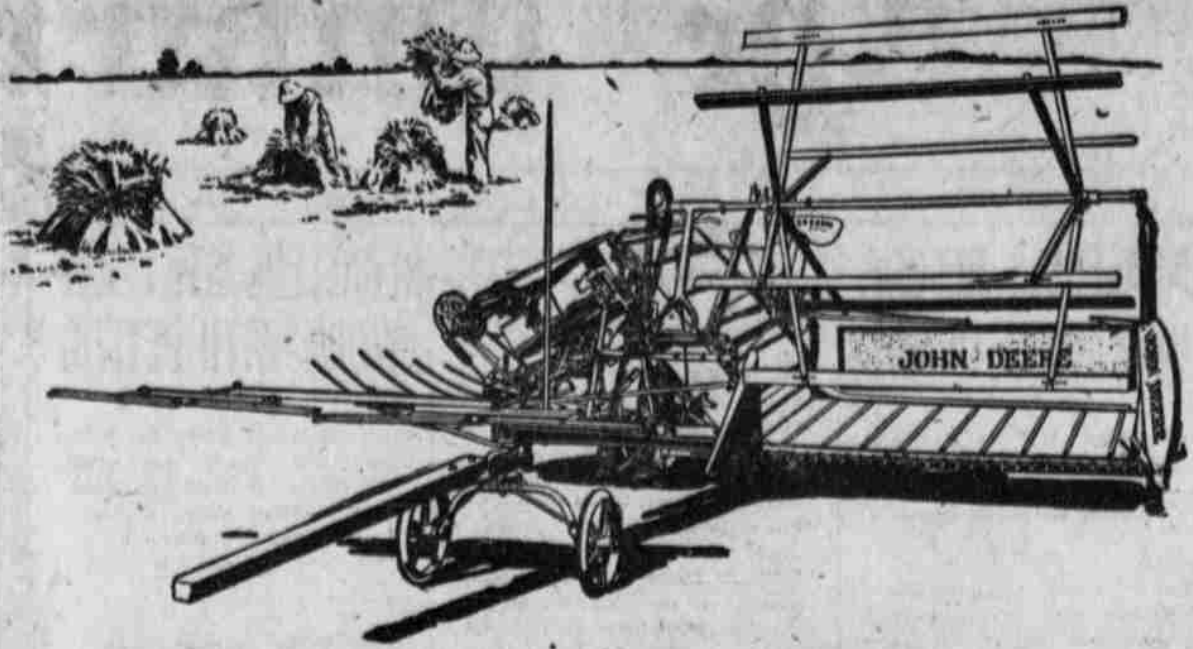
1. No person can offer for sale for dairy breeding use, any dairy bull that is not registered and licensed to be sold for such purpose.
 2. A Dairy Bull Registration Board is created for the purpose of registering these bulls.
 3. In order to secure a license, the owner of the bull must make application for the same to the Dairy Bull Registration Board and must furnish with the application the certificate of registration of the bull.
 4. He must also furnish a certificate which he makes out himself showing that the bull is to the best of his knowledge and belief free from any contagious or infectious disease.
 5. A license fee of \$1.00 is provided to cover the cost of administration. The College receives no appropriation to cover the cost of work of this kind.
- Upon receipt of these articles properly filled out the Dairy Bull Registration Board will issue a license authorizing the sale of the bull.

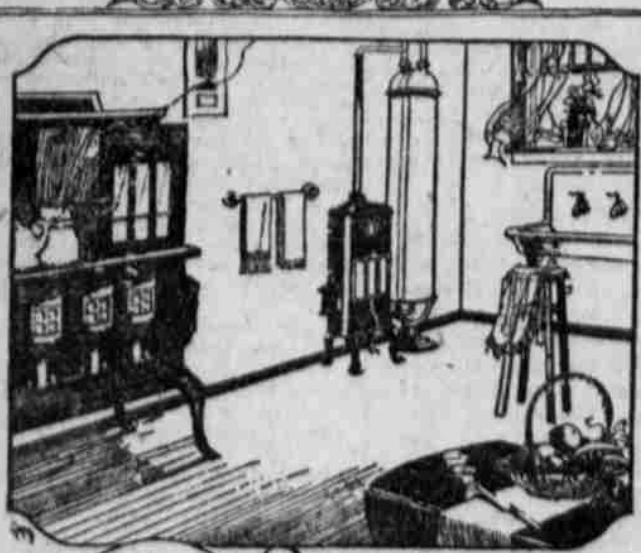
