**OREGON STATE NEWS**

SALEM, Or., June 21—(Special.)—A thoroughbred horse show will again be a feature of the state fair in September. This was decided at a meeting of the fair board in Salem recently.

Lloyd Romaine, Douglas county youth, has begun a life term in the state penitentiary for the murder of Abe Givens.

Because of litigation that has been instituted against the state highway commission in Polk county relative to the west side route of the Pacific highway, the commission fears the entire road building program in Polk county may be held up another year.

Captain Lyman Rice of Pendleton and Arthur C. Spencer, an attorney of Portland, have been appointed by Governor Olcott as members of the commission to administer the new soldiers' bonus and loan act. The other members of the commission are the governor, the secretary of state and the adjutant general.

Every employer who employs persons in hazardous occupations is subject to the provisions of the workmen's act unless he has given notice of his intention not to come under the act, according to an opinion of Attorney General Van Winkle, written in reply to an inquiry by the state industrial accident commission.

Water, light and gas utilities operating in Oregon are on until August 1 to file briefs in protest against a proposed uniform system of accounting adopted by the public service commissions of Oregon, Washington and Idaho for the utilities operating in the three states.

A pool tax, the return of automobiles to the tax rolls, further taxation on estates, state income taxes, and taxation of certain classes of ships that are not now taxed are some of the suggestions made by the state committee on taxation, created for the purpose of lightening the burden of taxation on land. The committee met in Salem during the week and I. N. Day was elected chairman.

A sharp drop in the cost of many food articles was revealed as compared with six months ago when the state board of control last Wednesday opened bids on supplies for the state institutions for the next six months. There has been a marked drop in beef, mutton and flour as well as in many staple groceries.

J. N. Phillips, known as "Buck" Phillips, who was killed by robbers in Portland Tuesday night, was a guard at the state penitentiary under Warden Stevens and Stetler.

The public service commission has ordered that a meter system be installed at Lakeview by the Lakeview Water company.

The Standard Oil Company reports to the secretary of state that for the month of May it sold in Oregon 2,896,399.5 gallons of gasoline and paid \$54,064 in taxes on the sales.

The Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railroad company has informed the public service commission that it has established summer excursion fares between Astoria and Tillamook beach points. The round trip fare to all points is \$1.10.

In conjunction with proceedings to determine all the water rights in Warner valley, Lake county, Lee McAllister of the state engineering department, is conducting a survey in both the north and the south portions of the valley.

The city of Salem has filed with the public service commission a protest against the proposal of the Southern Pacific company to increase street car fares from 5 to 7 cents in Salem, Eugene and West Linn. The protest will have the effect of suspending the proposed rates until a hearing is held.

At a meeting of the state highway commission in Portland, June 21, bids will be opened on road building projects in Curry, Lane, Washington, Yamhill, Clatsop, Jackson, Josephine, Lincoln, Tillamook and Umatilla counties.

Under the gasoline tax act of 1921 persons who use gasoline for other than motor vehicle driving on the highways are entitled to a rebate from the state for the fuel so used. It is necessary however that the claims for rebate be submitted to the secretary of state within ninety days after the date of sale. Several users have lost their rebate for the first three months of the law's operation because of tardiness in presenting the claims.

The Eastern Oregon Lumber company of Enterprise has canceled its notification of withdrawal from operation and the workmen's compensation act. Of ten Eastern Oregon companies that filed notice of withdrawal two have decided to remain under the act. The other is the Nibley-Minnugh company of

A new irrigation district, known as the Fort Vancouver district, has been organized in Josephine county, but is yet to receive the approval of the state irrigation securities commission to certify a bond issue of \$25,000 for construction work. The district embraces only \$80 acres.

Governor Olcott has announced that A. C. Barber, state insurance commissioner and state fire marshal, will be reappointed when his term expires, June 30.

Governor Olcott has officially proclaimed June 19 to 26 as cheese week in Oregon.

All local salary bills that were voted on in some counties of Oregon on June 7 were defeated.
